# Historic Date Marks Bid For Title

IT WAS A COINCIDENCE of sorts that a young man from Farmington happened to go gunning for a state championship in the high jump, and possibly a record, on Saturday, May 23, for although it was a different year that particular date standads out as the most memorable in all track and field history.

In 1935, May 25 also fell on a Saturday. The day dawned hot, clear and windless in Ann Arbor, and before sunset a streak of lightning from Ohio State University wrote a chapter without parallel in the history of sports.

It was on that afterneon that the incomparable Jesse Owens sped down the cinder strip on old farry Find 220-yeard low hurdles, tied another in the 100-yard dash and then went to the adjacent broad jump pit to create a third world mark in that event.

Although Owens is best remembered for the four gold medals he won during the 1936 Olympic Games at Berlin, his single greatest afternoon was on the very same field that John Mann of North Farmington High School was due to bid for his greatest triumph exactly 33 years later.

JUST A WEEK AGO, in the Class A regionals at Madison Heights, Mann cleared the high jump

bar at six feet seven inches, only an inch short of the Michigan prep record. Coaches speak of him as the best prospect in the state in this event and are predicting that eventually he will join the elite few who have gone seven feet or better.

John is 18, stands six-feet-three, weighs a slim 170 and is still growing.

He also lettered at North Farmington in basketball but it is his high jumping brilliance that has brought a parade of college talent seekers to his Briar Hill door.

As a senior, his final home appearance is scheduled for Tuesday in the triangular meet between the champions of the Interlakes, Northwest Suburban and Suburban Six conferences.
