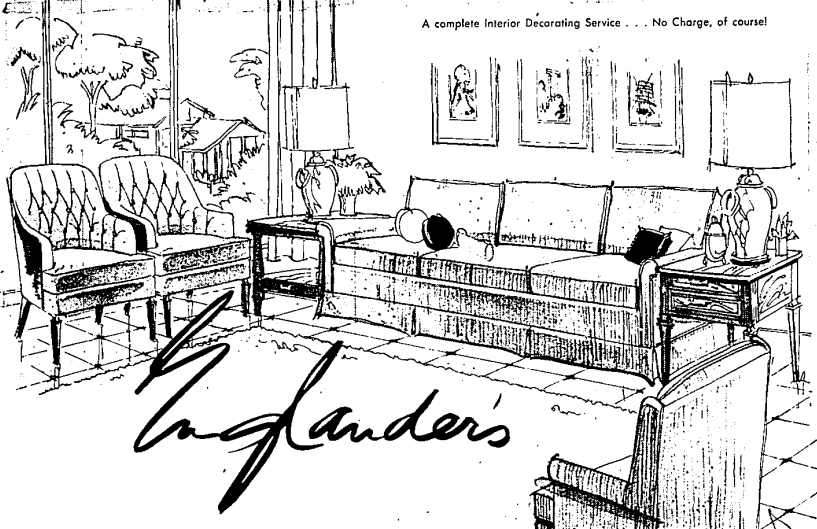

As a milk-carton gardener, I'm a dismal flop. Not that I'm much of a gardener of any kind. The flowers that dazzle in other people's gardens are often far to riddling in mine, and by the end of the summer the mixture of blooms and weeds is never quite what I envisioned in the spring. So when our first-grader announced this spring they were planting marigold seeds, I braced myself and resolved that THESE plants would grow. The milk carton had a shaky trip home, but we carefully set the seedlings upright and have watered them faithfully. They grew, all right. They are tall and spindly, but never have they developed the jagged characteristics of the plant. If those things are marigolds, I'll eat the milk carton.
