

GC West Wins League All-Sports Championship

A smashing series of spring-time performances has won the Tri Rivers League All Sports trophy for Garden City West for 1967-68.

West wound up with 48 1/2 points to beat out Schafer with 45 and Riverside 43 1/2.

The bulk of the West points were chalked up during the spring campaigning which ended last week with West placing

as follows in the league:

BASEBALL—Tied for first with Southgate.

TRACK—Second behind champion Schafer.

TENNIS—Champion with a 14-0 record in league dual action.

GOLF—Second with a 12-2 record.

In all, West piled up 29 1/2 points out of a possible 32 in

the spring sports. West had placed fourth in football and second in cross country last fall and second in basketball winter.

Wrestling and swimming didn't count in the sports trophy race because not all of the eight schools field teams in the two activities.

WEST'S TRACKMEN totaled

63 1/2 points to trail Schafer, which had 80 1/2. Cherry Hill was third with 57 1/2.

Four titles went to West in the meet. Dave Wilson won the long jump with a jump of 20 feet, five inches.

Jim Rhodes took the mile in 4:34.9 and Bob Herrick the 100-yard dash in 10.4 seconds.

Rhodes came through with a 50.3-second final quarter-mile

run to spark the West mile relay to a victory by a shade over Riverside.

Steve Sweda, Jerry Guzewski and Chris McCollum carried the Rhoades team to victory in the 400-yard dash.

Wilson came in second in the 440-yard run, setting a variety of 50.6 seconds to

equal his school mark of 22.8 seconds in placing second in the 220-yard dash.

West's Mike Cunningham was tied in the two mile while Bob Leach was fifth in the 880.

WEST SEIZED second in the golf race by beating Southgate, 177-197, as Mike Dunn and Rick Kramer each shot

42's, Ron Smith and Carl Evans each posted a 47.

The unbeaten tennis forces were led in singles by Bob Zajac, Tom Jablonski, Rick Masters and Ron Morrow.

Grid Stars In '47; Business Stars Now

ANN ARBOR—One of college football's greatest teams—the 1947 Michigan squad that won the Conference title and the 1948 Rose Bowl crown—is equaling its grid record in the business and professional worlds 20 years later.

Thirty-eight members of the 44-man Rose Bowl squad that scored 394 points to 53 for 10 opponents, led the Conference

statistics and set nine Rose Bowl records, gathered on the campus recently for their 20th reunion, and to pay tribute to their coach, Fritz Crisler, who retired as athletic director at Michigan, June 30.

Including the six who were unable to attend the reunion, all veterans of that Pasadena game are alive and in good health. All are successful in their

chosen fields.

CAPTAIN BRUCE HILKE, tackle, is director of salaried personnel at General Motors. Howard Yerges, brilliant quarterback, is a frozen foods company executive in St. Louis, Mo.

Of the backfield which Yerges directed, All-American halfback Bob Chaplin is an executive with the CentralSoy Company, Fort Wayne, Ind.; Bump Elliott, his All-American running-mate, is football coach at his Alma Mater, and Fullback Jack Wetsenburger heads an insurance company in Mount Pleasant, Mich.

On the offensive line, Bob Mann, left end, is in insurance in Detroit. His All-American running-mate Dick Rifenburg, is a radio and TV sportscaster in Buffalo, N.Y.

Guard Dominic Tomasi is an automotive engineer in Flint, and F. Stuart Wilkins, on the other side of center, is a Cantor, O., attorney. While is line coach at Penn State, Bill Pirtula, tackle, lives in Ann Arbor and is an automotive engineer.

DEFENSIVE END Ed McNeill is an automotive sales manager in Swanton, O., while Lemmy Ford is in the insurance business in Detroit.

The two tackles, Ralph Kohl and Al Wistart, also have been uniformly successful. Kohl, who lives in Charleston, Ill., is an NFL scout, while Wistart, later an All-American, is a manufacturer's representative who lives in Northville, Mich.

Joe Sobolewski is a high school coach in California and Quentin Sikkels, the other guard is a stockbroker in Detroit. Of the linebackers, Kurt Kampe, guard, is an executive for General Motors at Delia, O., and Dan Dworsky,

center, is a sales representative from Birmingham, Chuck Lentz, halfback is an engineer in Toledo, O., while George Johnson, tackle, is an automotive executive at Plymouth. Bob Hollway, end, is an assistant coach for the Minnesota Vikings.

Two other squad members are Bob Ballou, tackle, now in the forestry service at Cheyenne, Wyo., and Don Hershberger, end, is a personnel manager in Cincinnati, O. Halfback Don Kulick is a teacher and coach at Novi, while Irwin Small, quarterback is a Detroit dentist, and tackle Jim Atchison is a Cleveland engineer.
