

Ford Honors 37 Area Employees

Thirty-seven Ford Motor Company employees or their spouses from the six communities covered by the Observer Newspapers received "Outstanding Service Awards" at the ninth annual Detroit-area Ford Community Service Awards banquet.

But the report showed that last May firemen had responded to 108 rescue calls, nearly double the figure of 59 in May 1967, and also higher than the 81 of the previous month.

Through the five months of this year, firemen have responded to 792 alarms, as compared to 802 for the same period in 1967, and answered 469 rescue calls, compared to 347 for the first five months of 1967.

In other statistics, the fire prevention bureau made 55 inspections, 39 re-inspections, received 12 complaints, found 14 violations, all of which were issued notices.

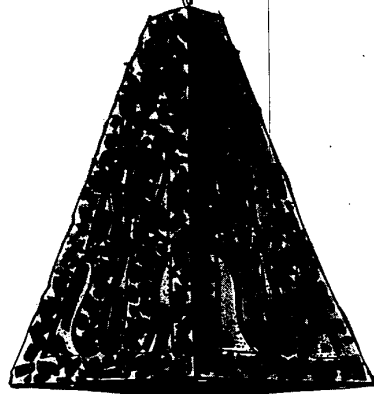
Fire Losses, Calls Soar In Westland

The Westland Fire Department reported a heavy increase in the number of blazes and the losses caused by fires during May.

In the monthly report issued by Fire Marshal Milton Quiring, figures showed that the fire losses for May were \$51,287 as compared to \$12,498 during the same month in 1967. For the first five months of the year, fire losses have totaled \$270,383, more than three times the figure of \$77,548 for the corresponding period last year.

The number of alarms in May totaled 155, more than the 129 of May 1967, but less than the 170 of the previous month.

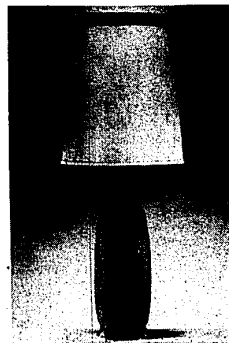

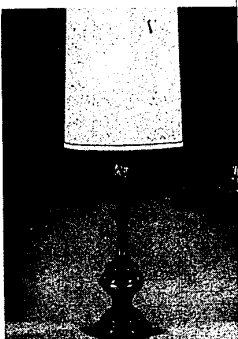
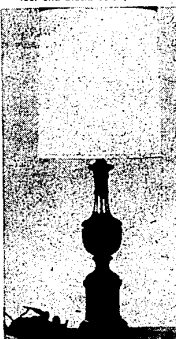
