Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women and who was elected a member of the proposed township incorporation charter commission in 1966.

George T. Crook, one of the present township staff who has served as chief electrical inspector for 12 years after 35 years as a Detroit electrical contractor.

Charles H. Williams, a certified public accountant with two years service on the zoning board and who also is outgoing president of the Farmington Jaycees.

Frederick Lichtman, vice-president of an oil corporation who has served as chairman of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission, village attorney of Wolverine Lake, Young Republicans, and who is older brother of recently elected Board of Education member Gary L. Lichtman.

He indicated petitions would

be filed for William E. Hatton, Allen Sultan and Mrs. William (Joyce) Hangerford.

Meanwhile, the question of whether there will be an election this year for township supervisor, clerk and treasurer still is up in the air. The Michigan Supreme Court will hold a hearing on the matter June 25, and no individual action is being taken until a ruling is handed down.

That the trusteeships held by Skillman and Oppertausser would be at stake in the 1968 election has been known for months, and traces to a ruling from Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley that positions filled by election in 1964 cannot be extended beyond four-year terms as the Legislature had sought to do.

However, the need to hold an election for the third post-caught officials of the township and of both major political parties by surprise early this week.

The upshot is that of the entire township hierarchy only Trustee Thomas R. Nolan is entirely safe from election worries this year. Appointed to the board three years ago, he then was reelected to a full four-year term in 1966 and remains untouched by legislative action.

## Township Boosts Inspectors

An amended contract between Farmington Township and its Building Department was approved at Monday night's Board of Trustees meeting.

The amendments raised the pay of the Building Inspector to \$8,760 per year and increased the monthly salary of the Zoning Enforcement Officer to \$750. Another change gave employees holidays on Veterans Day, Lincoln and Washington Birthdays.

The number of sick days was raised to 14 per year, and the maximum accumulated sick days was raised to 214. A final amendment raised expense allowance from \$1,000 to \$1,200 for Township employees using their car for business.

IN OTHER ACTION, the Board approved a rezoning request permitting a funeral home to be built in the Orchard Lake-12 Mile Rd. area.

The Board received a petition requesting road improvements in the Kendallwood Subdivision.

Public hearings were set for July 1 on the following requests: water for Conventy

Subdivision, 7:30 p.m.; water for Fairgreen and Golf Lake Hills subdivisions, 8 p.m.; and road improvements on Robinson, 8:30 p.m. A hearing for sewers on Grayfield St. was set for July 8 at 7:30 p.m.
