Sen. Hart Is Holiday Speaker

Phillip A. Hart, Michigan's senior United States senator, will accept an invitation to appear as principal speaker July 4 at an Independence Day celebration planned jointly by two Farmington Township subdivision associations.

Hart will deliver his address at 11:15 a.m. at Wooddale School. It will come as a climax to a parade which will be held at 1 and Colony Park subdivisions which abut each other in the area between 12 and 13 Mile Rds., west of Farmington Rd. The parade is scheduled for 10 a.m.

Theme of the day will be "The Contributions to American Independence of John Hancock, John Adams and Paul Revere." Although the parade has become an annual Fourth of July fixture in the two subdivisions, this is the first time a speaker of Hart's national stature has joined the affair. He was first elected to the U.S. Senate in 1958 after two terms as lieutenant governor of Michigan.

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
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
