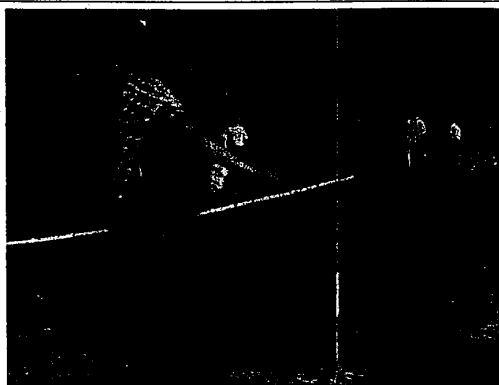

Planners Set Confabs

Following the precedent established by the Farmington Township Board and the Farmington City Council, the city and township planning commissions have established a schedule of joint meetings.

At the first of the sessions, held last week, the City Planners Chairman Fred Selbert and Township Planning Commission Chairman Charles Lorton were named as co-chairmen of the joint meetings.

The planners will meet on the fifth Thursday of the month. These dates will occur approximately four times a year.

The trustees and councilmen meet on the fifth Monday of the month—approximately four times a year.

Both Selbert and Lorton reported that the meeting had been helpful. Selbert commented on the "relaxed attitude" of the session and the "fine spirit" of the participants.

Lorton said that he was particularly impressed by the subcommittee structure of the city commission and hoped to be able to apply this method to the township commission.

Among the items discussed at the session was the problem of access to the new Power Junior High School and the thorny question of Salvatore St. Salvatore has been blocked off by the city for the past several years. When the construction work started on

Farmington Rd. between Eight and Nine Mile Rds, Salvatore was opened to provide an access from the Farmington Meadows Subdivision.

Residents of the township want Salvatore kept open. The subdivision association wants the street closed off in normal times because of traffic problems.

No conclusion was reached on this question, nor on any of the other topics discussed.

Accused
Of Slugging
Policeman

City of Farmington police officers at the drive-in center at 10 Mile and Orchard Lake Rds., with 18 court appearances already scheduled, brought new surveillance this week after an officer allegedly was slugged by a 17-year-old youth.

Peter A. Haglund, of 32905 Cloverdale, was the latest arrest on the No. 1 "problem corner" of city and township borders.

Haglund was accused of failure to obey an order to disperse when police broke up a gathering of youngsters after midnight last Thursday, and of hitting Officer Murray Switzer in the mouth with his fist. When he was arraigned before Municipal Judge Michael Hand, Haglund stood mute to charges of loitering and assaulting a police officer, and was released on \$100 personal bond. His trial was set for June 27.

Meanwhile, at least 18 other youths await municipal court examination July 2 on charges of loitering, stemming from their arrest two weeks ago in the same parking lot after a city-ordained curfew had gone into effect.

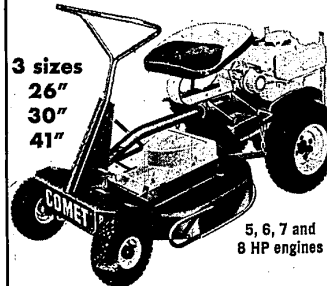
