

Detroit Town Hall Starts Wednesday

Fourteen of Italy's leading instrumentalists will comprise Virtuosi di Roma, small symphony orchestra which will open the Detroit Town Hall series Wednesday morning, October 18, at eleven o'clock in Fisher Theatre.

Renato Fasano, internationally known composer and conductor will direct the musicians who are making their first American tour under Italian government sponsorship. Fasano is former administrator of Academy of St. Cecilia in Rome.

Members of the orchestra come from Venice, Rome, Naples, and other musical centers in Italy. Among the artists who will give solo performances are Armando

Gramigna, brother-in-law of Arturo Toscanini, and Renato Ruotolo, concertmaster of San Carlo theater in Naples.

Other distinguished musicians to play are Tito Bartoli, foremost exponent of the contrabass; Benedetto Mazzacurati, famous concert cellist; and Ornella Puliti Santoliquido, said to be Italy's finest concert pianist.

The program to be given by Virtuosi di Roma will feature works of the Italian masters.

U. S. Officials Check Michigan Bird Ranges

Top U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service officials will inspect northern Michigan woodcock and grouse ranges this week end, the conservation department announced.

Accompanied by department game men in the upper peninsula tour will be Dr. Logan Bennett, chief, and Dr. Joseph Linduska, assistant chief of the research branch of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Remind Canadian Hunters Of Import Regulations

Michigan waterfowl hunters planning trips in Canada and Mexico are reminded by the conservation department of import regulations on migratory birds bagged. The department has but further restricted bird shipments to Michigan, as generally outlined by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Migratory waterfowl brought in or shipped from Canada will need tags or permits if required by provincial or dominion law. Mexico prescribes a Mexican export permit, or a license endorsement by a game official authorizing export of birds, or display of hunting license on which seal of issuing office has been stamped.

Birds imported from other country, if dressed, must have head, head plumage and feet attached. Packages are to be marked with name and address of shipper and consignee as well as with the number and kinds of birds enclosed.

A hunter can in any one calendar week, during the open seasons in the two countries and for five days after closing closing dates, import 10 ducks with exception of American and red-breasted mergansers on which there is no limit. One of the 10 may be a wood duck. Twenty Eider ducks or scoters can be brought back except that the limit may include 14 old squaw ducks. Others which may be brought or shipped in include six geese (except Ross' geese) and brant in any combination but not over two Canada geese, white-fronted geese or brant. Others which can be imported are 15 coot, eight woodcock, eight hand-tailed pigeons, 10 mourning doves and white-winged doves in any combination, 15 rails and gallinules (except sora) in any combination and 25 sora.

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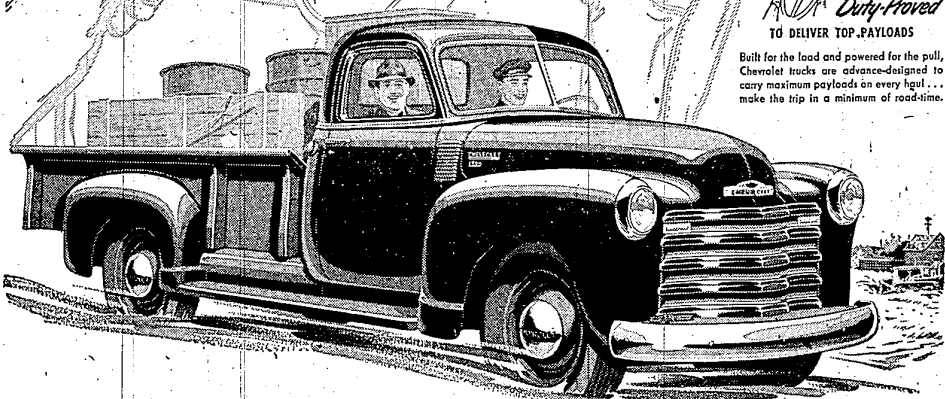
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
