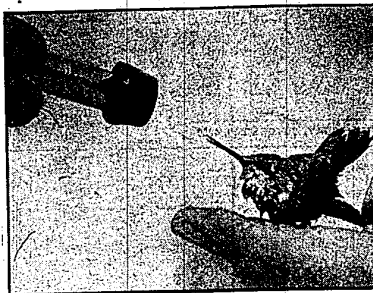

Subjects to be presented include financing of public education, roads, cooperatives, with other questions anticipated from the audience. The program is planned for audience participation.

Fall planting of 4,500,000 seedlings and transplants has started in state forests.

The conservation department's forestry division also is shipping the first of some 17,000,000 trees available for private reforestation projects this fall and next spring. The largest stockpile the department ever has been able to offer includes nine classes of pine.
