

Oil Exploration Moves Northward

Further northward movement of petroleum exploration is indicated in requests of oil companies and independent operators for the conservation department to schedule a record 194,231 acres for public oil and gas lease auctions in Lansing this week.

Top previous lease-offering was 173,000 acres in May of last year. With exception of 89 acres, the

department's lands division says all acreage in the 25 counties represented is unproven or wildcat. The 30-acre parcel in Kalkaska County's Barfield Township is adjacent to a producing gas well in the recently discovered Cannon creek field.

Over 149,000 acres to be offered for development are in six counties, including Crawford with 39,000 acres, but also Otsego, Oshtemo, Rosamund, Wexford and Grand Traverse.
