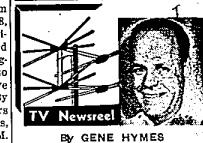
## Seniors Learn About Railroad Journey

## Land Buyers Take 1000 Acres From State

Purchasers of tax-reverted land paid the state \$12,747 for 1,000 acres and 69 platted lots and other small parcels offered by the conservation department at three public auctions.

Sales, covering descriptions in 24 mostly northern counties, were held at Baldwin, Gladwin and Bellevue. Another 435 acres and 23 lots and parcels not sold at these auctions now can be purchased from the department's lands division for minimum appraisal prices.

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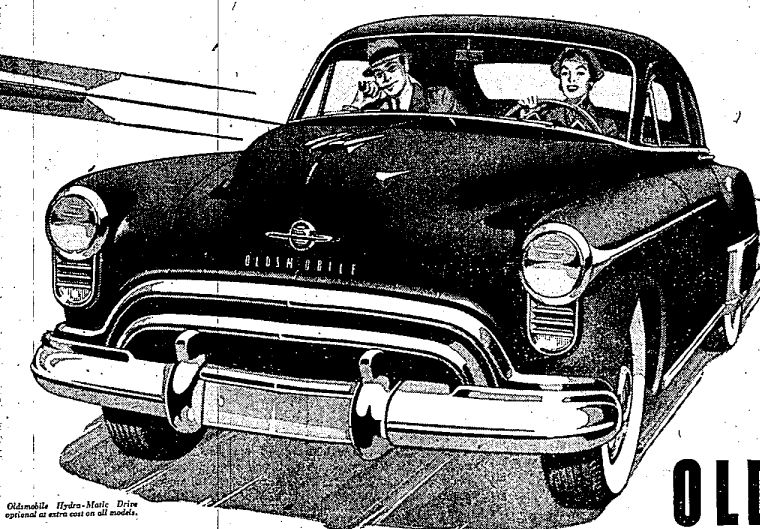

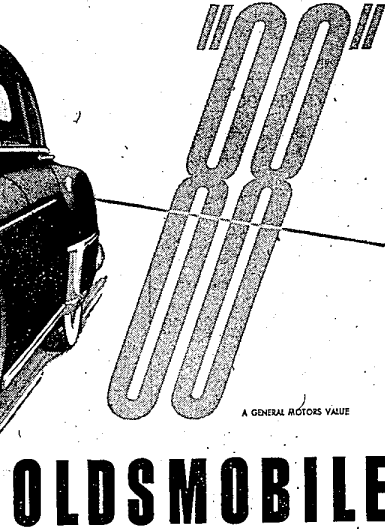
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
