Oakland County Lakes Get OK For Ciscoe Nets

Including six added Oakland county lakes, the conservation department announces 46 southern Michigan lakes will be open to taking ciscoes with gill nets from November 15 through December 10.

Special season netting will be permitted in Cass, Cedar Island, Cemetery, Commerce, Deer and Oshtemo lakes. Another Oakland county lake, Upper Pettibone, will be open the same as last year. Gill nets again may be set in Barry county in Barlow, Britton, Carr, Big Cedar, Little Cedar, Fish, Lime and Long (Johnstown township) lakes; Branch county in Bartholomew, Coldwater, Dorsey, Haystack, Kenyon, Marble, Morrison, Pleasant and Rose lakes; in Cass county in Baldwin, Birch (Dallport permit required from department representative), Bunker, Cuthbert, Davis, Deerpark, Hartwood, Indiana, Kirks, Lewis, Lime, Long (Porter Township), Shavehead, Weatherbee, Wood, and Little Wood lakes; Kalamazoo county in Indian Lake and St. Joseph; in Calhoun, Custer, Klinger, Middle, Pepper and Thompson lakes.

The department points out that over 100 southern Michigan lakes and streams now are open to fishing with spear and artificial light for whitefish, suckers, carp and ciscoes. Season closes December 31 as will the special season under way on 17 upstate lakes.
