

Freshman Class At U-M Shows Alumni Influence

One out of five of the freshmen who enrolled at the University of Michigan this fall are sons and daughters of alumni parents.

This fact was disclosed in a comprehensive study last completed by the Michigan Alumni, the publication of the University's Alumni Association.

The Alumni made such a survey last year for the first time and found 18 per cent of the 1949 freshmen had alumni parents. The percentage increased to 20 this year.

Hazzard says an increase in the number of breeders is a possibility in about two years.
