The number of graduate students at Michigan State College jumped more than 10 per cent this fall, according to a survey of campus enrollment. The official report of Registrar Robert S. Linton showed an increase in graduate students from 1,412 last year to 1,575 this fall.

The rise in graduate students came in spite of a general decrease in college population. This fall's total enrollment was 14,993 compared to 16,243 last fall.
