Michigan Deer Give Good Chase To Virginia

Michigan deer apparently are giving Virginia hunters a merry chase. The conservation department has been advised that a 300-pound, 10-point buck with the Michigan tag No. 2419 has been bagged in the November hunting season, 11 years after its release in Virginia. As a yearling in 1939, the animal weighed 90 pounds. It was live-trapped near Atlanta.

The conservation department permitted the live-trapping of about 150 upstate deer during the acute 1939 winter starvation period. Virginia game officials arranged for the transfer of the white-tails.

The transplanting program was an effort to remove a number of deer that were certain to die of starvation in critical areas, mainly in Crawford and Schoolcraft counties.
