SURVEY HOUSING FACILITIES FOR EMERGENCY USE

State Police Commissioner Donald S. Leonard, who is also state civil defense director, has announced that arrangements have been completed with the American Red Cross to conduct a state-wide emergency housing and feeding survey. Thirty-one counties have been selected for the initial phase as follows:

Allegan, Barry, Bay, Berrien, Branch, Calhoun, Cass, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Ingham, Ionia, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Kent, Leape, Lawrence, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Muskegon, Oakland, Ottawa, Saginaw, St. Clair, St. Joseph, Shiawassee, Van Buren, Washtenaw and Wayne.

The survey started this week and will cover in under way in all of these counties. It will be extended to other counties after the first group has been completed.

Although the Red Cross chapter in each county will conduct the survey, it will be a civil defense project operating under the supervision of local civil defense directors.

There will be no house to house canvass, but an inventory of such facilities as schools and other buildings and structures which could be used and would be available for the housing and feeding of evacuees in event of an emergency.

Such data as type and condition, maximum sleeping capacity, heating system, utility and sanitation provisions, and kitchen equipment, if any, will be collected and compiled in an inventory, copies of which will be kept by the local and state offices of civil defense. Rural areas as well as cities will be covered, and a summary compiled for each city and a total for each county.

1949-50 Statistics Favor Two U-D Guards

A breakdown on statistics for University of Detroit's 1949-50 season shows why Jim (Skip) Gleason and Captain Brendan McNamara are rated the classiest guard combination in the Missouri Valley Conference. They set up 297 field goals for their teammates while scoring 324 points, making them directly responsible for 708 of 1,521 Titan points last year. They also stole the ball from opponents 81 times. Both attended Chicago Mt. Carmel High School.

STATE POLICE OPEN RANKS TO MORE RECRUITS

The Michigan State Police have opened up recruiting in preparation for a training school session to start shortly after the holidays. It is announced by Commissioner Donald S. Leonard.

Men interested in joining the department may obtain further information by going to any State Police post or by writing to the State Civil Service Commission or the State Police headquarters in East Lansing. Applications should be filed at once, so that qualification procedures can be completed in time for candidates to enter the school.

Candidates may be married or single, but must be between the ages of 21 and 30 inclusive, not less than five feet 10 inches in height, of good physical build and in good health. Draft status also will be considered. During the nine-week school session trainees are paid \$100 a month and live at the school. Graduates are sworn in as troopers and in addition to salary receive a subsistence allowance, uniforms and equipment and lodging. The position offers security and interesting work. In addition, State Police are eligible for retirement on pension at the end of 25 years of service.

The school is being held to fill 40 vacancies in the department. Another school session closed December 11, adding 60 troopers.

STATE'S ANIMALS DON'T MIND COMING OF COLD WEATHER

Michigan's game animals are doing quite well, thank you.

Heavy surge of snow and cold weather has started shunting deer toward the yarding areas and the bears have beat at least a temporary retreat to their dens. But conservation department game men say it would take a prolonged siege of winter with deep snows to cause real trouble in the animal world.

Usually it takes a foot or more of snow to force the deer into winter quarters. Any resemblance to a thaw in December could bring the bears out again before they hibernate for the duration.

Bulk of the migrating ducks have left the state, however some of the other migrants will keep the local ducks company this winter. Observers will be able to see a few canvasbacks, redheads, goldeneyes and scaups particularly along the Detroit river. A few whistling swans also might be viewed along the river.

In spite of early snows, pheasants still have access to weed seeds, waste grain and shrub fruits. The ringnecks may be hunched together a little more and consequently a little easier to spot. Grouse rarely are bothered by winter since they feed well above the snow line.

And the rabbits? Their main problem is to keep a few steps ahead of the hunters.

1950 MEASLES EPIDEMIC SUBSIDES; 1951 TO BE BETTER

The 1950 measles epidemic in Michigan is subsiding and we can look toward a comparatively small number of cases in 1951. Dr. F. S. Leeder, Director, Division of Disease Control, Records and Statistics of the Michigan Department of Health, said today. Measles epidemics usually occur in two-year cycles in Michigan.

Nearly 35,000 cases of measles have been reported so far this year, but only 45 of them in the past week, Dr. Leeder said. Highest incidence occurred during the early part of the year when there were over 2,000 cases being reported each week.

Measles is one of the most contagious of all the acute communicable diseases. No person is immune who has not had the disease, except infants under one year whose mothers have had measles. It is most serious among pre-school children.

At one time measles had a high mortality rate among infants, but the use of gamma globulin, a blood product, has done much to reduce the death toll. Gamma globulin is used to modify the disease in youngsters or to prevent it in infants and older children who are physically below par.

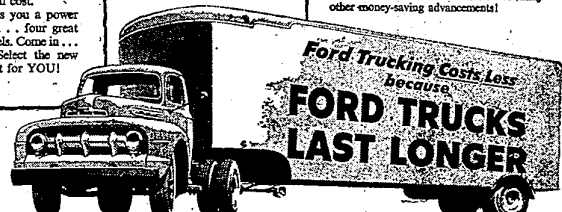
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
