Storage Permit Needed After 60 Day Period

The conservation department reminds hunters to get storage permits if they plan to save pheasant or other wild game more than 60 days past the end of the hunting season.

No permit is needed in the 60-day post season period but within five days after this period expires, owners and operators of storage places must notify the department of game in their possession for which no permits have been secured.

The free permit can be obtained from the local conservation officer or district headquarters. Permit is required for both imported game and game taken in Michigan.

Permits for keeping waterfowl are limited by federal regulations to an additional 30 days.

Apprehend Eight For Break-Ins

Farmington police assisted members of Detroit's "Security Squad" last week in apprehending a group of adults and juveniles, some of whom have admitted to approximately 10 breaking and enterings in northwest Detroit and Farmington Township.

Farmington's chief of police J. G. DeVriendt said he was called by the Detroit officers and asked if he could assist them in locating Dale Pound, 19, and Emil LaChevalier, 19. The chief could; he and Sgt. Alfred Vandell led the officers to the residences of both men.

The pair admitted 16 burglaries then; later the number was increased. Pound, LaChevalier and his wife and five juveniles were apprehended by the State Police in connection with the break-ins. DeVriendt said Tuesday.

Loft from the burglaries was found in a cabin at which Pound was staying, and in the LaChevalier home. The three were booked on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen goods.

The two men will stand trial in Detroit for several super market robberies, DeVriendt says. They have admitted the supermarket robberies and other break-ins outside Detroit, including a gas station at Eight Mile and Farmington Road, a grocery store at 10 Mile and Orchard Lake, and others.

Included in the group of juveniles picked up by State Police were a 15 year old girl and other teenagers. Police had to travel to Brighton to apprehend two of the youngsters.


