Storage Permit Needed After 60 Day Period

The conservation department reminds hunters to get storage permits if they plan to save pheasant or other wild game more than 60 days past the end of the hunting season.

No permit is needed in the 60-day post season period but within five days after this period expires, owners are required to go to the place to notify the department of game in their possession for which no permits have been secured.

The free permit can be obtained from the local conservation officer or district headquarters. Permit is required for both imported game and game taken in Michigan.

Permits for keeping waterfowl are limited by federal regulations to an additional 30 days.
