Council Decides Dance Rules

In the last issue of The Trojan Banner, an article concerning new dance regulations was perhaps misunderstood and misinterpreted by some students. Until last Wednesday, January 3, nothing had officially been passed by the Student Council on the matter.

The council at their regular meeting passed three proposed amendments to their regulations of dances.

1. The price of admission shall be 30 cents unless an orchestra is provided, then the admission shall be 50 cents. (Only four dances, one to each high school grade, will provide orchestras throughout the school year.)

2. All outsiders and alumni will be charged 50 cents.

3. Alumni of no more than two years may secure semester guest passes. Passes may be renewed at the end of the semester.

Alumni, in order to receive a semester pass, should apply in person or by letter to the principal. Each application will be approved by a board of three students and three teachers.

These regulations have been approved by the Student Council sponsor and will go into effect at the next dance.
