## MSC ASKS STATE AID FOR LIBRARY

Michigan State College has requested an appropriation of \$4,250,000 by the state legislature for the construction of a new library building.

Following extensive research into the library needs of MSC, final plans are being completed with funds advanced by the federal government, according to Dr. William H. Combs, dean of the All-College Division, under which the library is administered.

The proposed 4 story building will accommodate 3,000 students at one time, and will be located southwest of Beaumont Tower next to Bond Garfield Botanical gardens. The site and plans allow for future expansion on two sides.

The library, with a gross floor area of 241,559 square feet, would replace the general library, library annex, and a costly system of branch libraries in other campus buildings. The present library was built in 1923 to provide for a student enrollment of about 3000.

Utilizing present library facilities to the fullest, MSC has only 56.6 per cent of the seating capacity necessary for its 15,000 students, Dr. Combs said.
