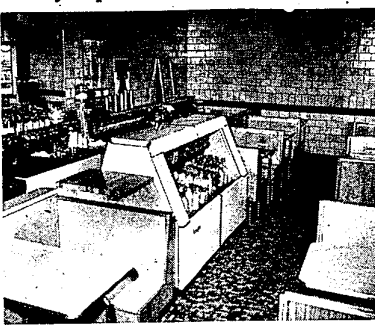
Harry B. MacRae To Give Christian Science Lecture

MSC Researchers Get \$14,985 Grant

Michigan State College social scientists are going to take a new approach to mental health by studying the healthy instead of the sick. The Social Research Service of MSC has been awarded a grant-in-aid of \$14,985 by the National Institute of Mental Health, U. S. Public Health Service, for the study.

The grant provides for a pilot study of "social strengths in mental health", according to Dr. Charles R. Hoffer, acting head of the Social Research Service. Dr. Hoffer said the study will begin early in 1951 and probably continue into 1952.

"The project differs from most mental health studies because it will examine normal people to determine what it takes in human resources to make successful adjustments to modern living," Dr. Hoffer said.

"This is one of the first studies in the U. S. to focus on the mental health of average people, the MSC researchers said."
