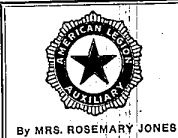

POLICE SURVEY SPOTS HEAVIEST ACCIDENT AREAS

In an effort to check the mounting toll of traffic injuries and deaths on rural trunkline highways, State Police are giving priority attention to 29 sections with high accident histories, according to Commissioner Donald S. Leonard.

The entire rural trunkline system comprises only 8,308 miles of the more than 100,000 miles of streets and highways in Michigan, but it accounts for more than 40 per cent of all traffic deaths and more than a third of the total mileage traveled in the state.

A study made by the State Police safety and traffic bureau also discloses that nearly 50 per cent of the accidents and more than 40 per cent of the fatalities reported on rural trunkline highways occur on only 12 per cent of the system. Data for the study were gathered over a five-year period.

"A guide for selective enforcement based on this study has been developed which makes possible the most effective use of available officers for patrol duty," Leonard said.

During the first 11 months of 1950, a total of 14,600 accidents reported on the rural trunklines resulted in 9,579 injuries and 610 deaths. Compared with the same 2,544 or 21 per cent.

(Continued from Page Two) of 15 other states as well as the federal security administration, the veterans administration and the United Nations health headquarters are asking for copies of the plans.

Due to increased volume of sales tax collections, now shared by the Michigan public school teacher salaries have advanced from ninth to fourth place in the nation.

But Dr. Lee M. Thurston, superintendent of public instruction, fears that the trend toward increasing reliance of localities upon state-collected funds for school support is lessening the local sense of responsibility toward the community institutions.

The superintendent also advocates more community colleges to bring at least junior colleges within reach of students living in areas remote from the existing colleges and universities.

This year is expected to be a good one for all-out farm production. Even with ceilings, prices will be high, economists say, and farmers can expect a good net income.

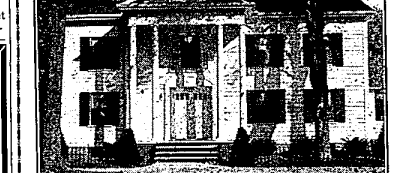
