APPROVE LARGEST LAND PURCHASE AT JANUARY SESSION

One of the largest land purchases planned in several years was approved by the conservation commission at its January meeting.

Involved is a total of 12,587 acres suitable for game and hunting, recreation, forests and fishing access. Purchase options on about 7,567 acres already have been secured.

Approved are two new state wildlife areas, the Pittsford project in Hillsdale county and the Maple river project in Gratiot and Clinton Counties. First Pittsford acquisition will be 1,091 acres; for the Maple river, 522 acres. The commission authorized purchase of a total of 5,229 acres for the latter project as necessary options can be obtained.

January commission action will add 550 acres to the Gregory state game area, Livingston county. Addition of 3,670 acres to the Houghton Lake state forest was authorized, including a 120-acre parcel for waterfowl flooding. Others are 80-acre extension to the Eganville River state forest and 40 acres suitable for flooding, to the Sturgeon River forest.

Public water frontage access to be purchased consists of 40 acres to the Maple river, Gratiot County; 37 acres on Green lake and 30 acres on Henry lake, both in Antrim County; 15 acres on the Jordan river, Charlevoix County; 100 acres on Houghton lake, Roscommon County; and 350 feet on Tamarack lake, Montcalm County.

Deer Hunters Major Game Law Violators

Deer hunters again were responsible for over 50 percent of November conservation law violations, but the total of 1,084 arrests was 26 less than in November, 1949.

The conservation department's law enforcement division reports the recent season violators paid slightly more in fines and costs, \$35,528, but spent far fewer days in jail, 155. In the November 1949 period, punishment was \$32,091 in fines and costs and 1,175 jail days.

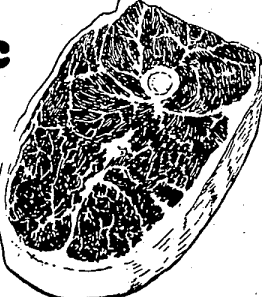
