Editorial:

Vote "Yes" At The April 9 Election

The Clarencville Board of Education authorized the holding of a special election for the purpose of voting on a proposition to raise the tax limitation by \$5 mills. Five mills mean \$5,000 additional local tax on each \$1,000 of taxable property valuation. For the average property owner in the district, the cost would be about 2 cents per day.

At present, current local tax collections for operations in any one year runs but \$3,000 more than the cost for wages of custodians, fuel, water, gas, lights and power, telephone and other such types of expenditures.

If your cost of bus transportation were added to the above, local taxes would fall about \$4,000 to \$5,000 short of meeting the total cost of maintenance and bus transportation.

To sum up, this would leave no funds from local sources available for general control, instructional services, fixed charges and capital outlay.

Three questions a voter should consider are:

1. Shall the school district main-

tain the same school services?

2. Shall the district be able to meet increased cost for services?

3. Shall the district continue maintenance of bus transportation without more adequate financial assistance?

Vote "Yes" in these three proposals on April 9, to insure the students of the community a new bus and other advantages. Remember, only you, the voters, can help them. S. S.

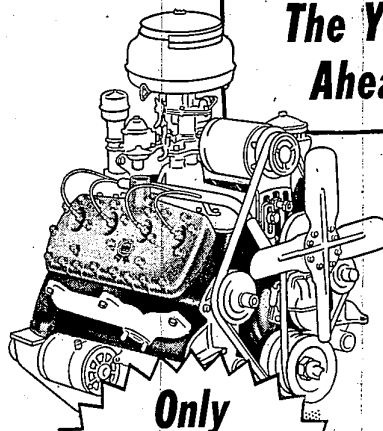
