MSC Given Grants Totaling \$99,041.20

A total of \$99,041.20 in gifts and grants for Michigan State College have been accepted by the State Board of Agriculture, governing body of the college.

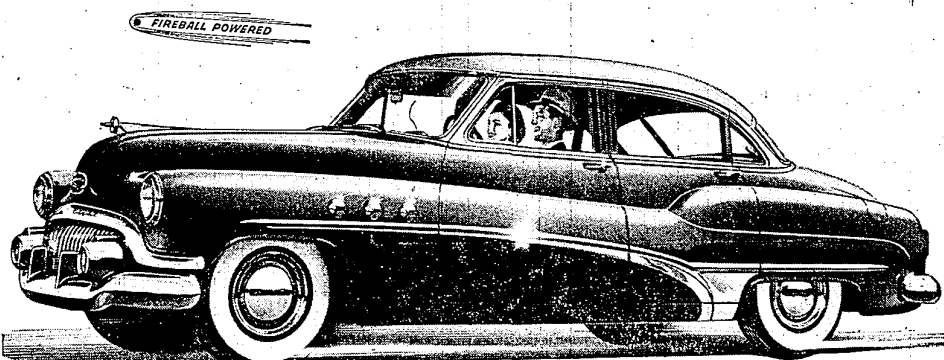
Roll Call: Hutton, Otis, Loomis, Miller and Cavanaugh. Carried, all yeas.

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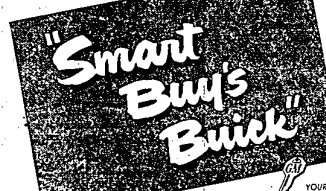
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
