The matter has been under discussion and consideration for many months by the Township Board. A number of persons have appeared before the Board suggesting various locations for the fire hall. The Board has indicated their intention to establish a branch fire department along with a new voting precinct. We believe there is sufficient information available now for the Board to make a constructive decision.

Farmington Township residents need the extra protection now. The fire equipment is available and volunteers can be recruited in the more heavily populated areas of the township where a fire station should be located. The decision must come from the Board and it should come soon. As the township continues to grow, this closer fire protection will become even more important.

A matter as important as this can not be done hastily, but as early as January, 1949, when the motion to purchase the new fog fire truck was approved, the Board discussed the possibility of putting the older truck in the Clarenceville area. The discussions have continued from time to time. We believe that a decision can be made now and better protection can be provided.

The people want it, need it, and deserve it. The few minutes saved may have a home or maybe a life. Action should be taken!

But they have no control over the weather or the lack of previous repair on the main roads in the community. The situation is serious portionarly in a state

The Farmington area is just one of thousands all over the state where roads are next to impassable. Neither the county nor the state have had sufficient maney in recent years to read and main sufficient money in recent years to repair and maintain present highways. Now the middle has caught up with the end.

What can be done? The answer lies in securing what can be done? The answer has in secting sufficient money to do the job. It means appropriating enough state money or setting up new state taxes to take care of the highways. Efforts are now being made to find such money. But, unfortunately, it will now cost far more to rebuild than it would have had we done the right job of maintenance.
