The theme of the film was a plea

world. At the start, the movie

traced the origin of early forms of

life. Subsequent scenes showed

over the earth and the resulting

The closing part of the film stated

tures and creeds, or otherwise be

destroyed.

The picture very definitely pointed

out the need for brotherhood.

Although not completely under-

SPEECH CONTESTS FOR FORENSICS STARTED AT F. H. S.

Forensics competition has interested 15 Farmington High students. They will compete in a school speech contest to be held March 16 in the school library.

There are five entries in Dramatic Interpretation. These selections, from plays and novels, cannot exceed 10 minutes.

Three freshmen and sophomores will give declamations. Declamations are famous speeches and have to be memorized.

Five students will give their own speeches on current topics. The maximum length is 1500 words.

Three pupils are interested in extemporaneous speaking. This consists of impromptu orations on current topics from either Time or News-week Magazine.

In extemporaneous speaking, the students draw a topic in a sealed envelope, held by a judge. He then takes his magazine relating to the topic to a room where he will have an hour to re-read and prepare a five to seven minute speech.




