

APRIL 1 DEADLINE FOR LEGION POPPY POSTER CONTEST

Students in grades four through twelve are eligible for the annual American Legion Poppy Poster Contest.

There are three classes: The first for fourth, fifth and sixth graders, the second for grades seven, eight and nine, the third is open for students in grades ten, eleven and twelve.

The local awards are the same for all three classes; \$3 for first prize, \$2 for second prize and \$1 for third. The National awards vary. In the first class they are \$15 first, \$10 second, \$5 third. Second class awards are \$25 first, \$15 second and \$10 third. In the third class prizes are \$50 for first, \$25 for second and \$15 for third prize.

The posters must measure fourteen inches by twenty inches and be on posterboard, chipboard, pasteboard or cardboard. The words "American Legion Auxiliary" or "The American Legion" must appear on each entry.

Also the Fladders poppy in the correct color and a proper slogan of ten words or less must be on the poster.

Mr. Benjamin will accept entries before April first.

The judging is based on appeal of the message, artistic quality, originality and neatness. A. C.

BOOK CIRCULATION HITS ALL TIME MARK AT HIGH SCHOOL

Book circulation at Farmington High Library reached 1330 in November, the highest circulation of any month during the last semester and a new four year record according to figures released by the librarian. This figure includes 979 fiction books and 351 non-fiction books.

Other figures show that the per pupil average has also increased steadily since 1947-48. At that time the average circulation per pupil for the entire year was 7.85. Last semester's average alone was already 7.65.

These figures do not include magazines, reference books, vertical file materials, or any other books used in the library.

"The circulation is large for the number of books in the library," said Miss Brandenburg, "but many more volumes are needed to take care of the demand."

Since television has become popular, circulation in some libraries has decreased by approximately 10 per cent, Miss Brandenburg added. Purchase of new books helped to boost book circulation. The library now contains approximately 2500 volumes. G. M.

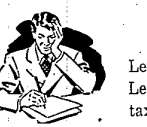
