Few Taxpayers See Review Board

Few Farmington taxpayers took the opportunity to discuss their tax assessments with members of the city and township Boards of Review Tuesday when the groups met to hear complaints and make adjustments on assessment figures. At the city members of the board met all day long, but were able to find only three visitors who wanted to see them. The same number visited at the meeting in the afternoon at the Town Hall, where members of the Township Board of Review spent the day inspecting the tax rolls.

Purpose of the Board meetings is to allow taxpayers to inspect the following year's tax assessments and ask for adjustments in their assessments. The rolls are open for inspection all during meetings of the Board of Review. Although only a few chose Tuesday to see the Board, other unhappy taxpayers will still have an opportunity to ask adjustments. Both City and Township Boards of Review will meet again Monday and Tuesday, March 12 and 13, to hear taxpayers. The Boards meet from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.

If the proposal is approved the money would be used for salaries for additional teachers needed in the system, for maintenance of present buildings and the purchase of additional school bus transportation. Louis Schmidt stated that this issue should not be confused with the District's application for Federal Aid, which would be used for the construction of new buildings. Schmidt stated that even if this Federal Aid is granted it is not the money for operation will still be needed. The superintendent added that the District is entitled under the act to receive \$220,000 in Federal Aid for new building construction, however, there is no definite assurance that the District will receive this money. The Board has authorized the application for Federal Aid and the information is being compiled.

Oil Lease Auction

One of the richest states oil and gas lease auctions in years produced bids on only 21,117 acres and netted only \$9,716. Over 39,000 acres of primarily wildcat land were offered.
The previous offering of exploration leases on state land, last October, was the largest ever held with 152,550 acres leased for \$284,558.
The February sale saw bids of a below average 35 cents an acre. Chief bidders were the Sun Oil Company, Toledo; Carter Oil Company, Grand Rapids; and the Superior Oil Company, Grand Rapids.

Little longer to give more.
Anyone who has received sulfur, penicillin, aureomycin, or similar antibiotics in the two week period before March 20 are not acceptable. If you have a history of heart disease or jaundice you cannot be accepted as a donor.
Donors having malaria will be accepted provided they haven't had a recurrence within the past 18 months. People eating fats, cream, fat meats, rich soups, and gravies within four hours prior to donations are not acceptable as donors; however, it is advisable to eat before donating.
So you needn't go without lunch on March 20 - just call 3908 or 1421 and let the Red Cross know they can count on you for a pint of blood.
