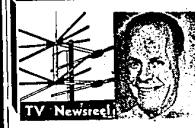

SUPERINTENDENT ATTENDS ATLANTIC CITY CONVENTION

Mr. Louis Schmidt, superintendent of the Farmington school system, attended a convention held at Atlantic City, New Jersey, February 17-21. The convention was a national meeting of the American Association of School Administrators. There were members present from all parts of the United States. Among those who spoke were General George C. Marshall, secretary of Defense, who spoke on "Mobilization and Education"; Carlos P. Romulo, secretary of Foreign Affairs and a permanent delegate to the United Nations, who spoke on "The United Nations and the Far Eastern Crisis"; C. E. Wilson, president of General Education, who spoke on "The Platform of Freedom"; and Jesse Stewart, the author of "The Thread That Runs So True", spoke on "Education for a New People".

A musical program consisted of an all-Philadelphia senior high school orchestra concert, and an allegory depicting forces which build a united world was presented by the Atlantic City High School. On the way to Atlantic City, many members of the Association stopped at Lake Success in New York where the United Nations Trusteeship Council met. The discussion was concerning the Pacific Islands. Representatives of the United States reported on the Pacific Islands, for which we are trustees.

Mrs. Bert Boltho is starting a knitting class in her home. Any lady who is interested might give her a call and make arrangements.

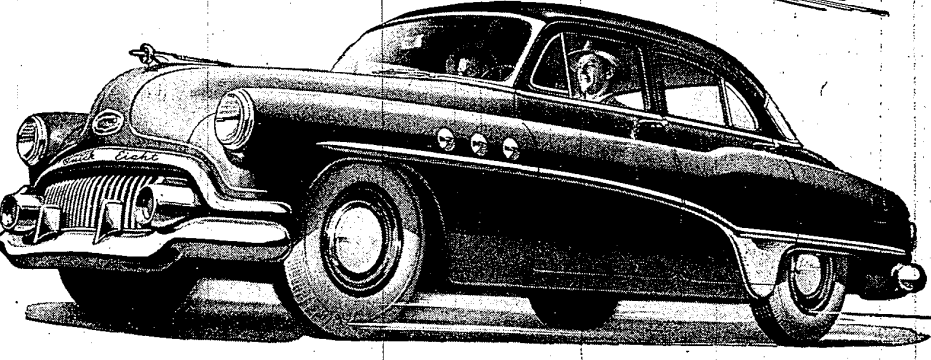

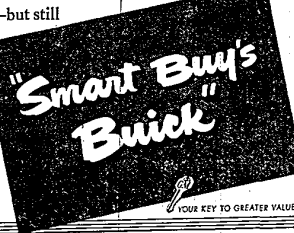
