On Child Behavior

"Why Your Children Act As They Do" will be explained next Tuesday, March 20, by Mrs. Belle Farley Murray when she appears before the Farmington Parent-Teachers Association.

"This is a good time for parents to find out what makes Bobby quiet and bashful, Susie noisy and active, and Billy shy and unsocial," according to Mrs. Carl Synob, program chairman for the group. "Mrs. Murray is an expert at knowing child behavior, and her talk is bound to be valuable to parents."

Mrs. Murray has appeared in Farmington several times previously, and has conducted classes here. She is a lecturer and family relations consultant for the University of Michigan Extension service, and has cooperated with the State Board of Control for Vocational Education since 1941. She has given courses on the family at Wayne University, and was director of religious education at Christ Church, Cranbrook, as well as being on the staff of the Merrill-Palmer School in Detroit as specialist in parent education. She has also taught at Highland Park High School.

The Extension Service has requested that the meeting start promptly at 8 p.m. Following the meeting, refreshments will be served by kindergarten mothers. Mrs. Robert Dawson is chairman of the table decorations committee.

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

Now Listen, Hiram:
