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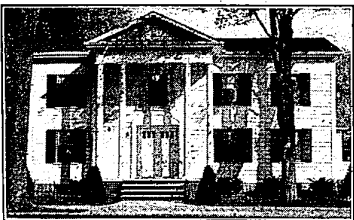

State TB hospital situation looks better. When the new Flint hospital transfers Genesee county patients from the Howell sanitarium, 100 beds will be open for Wayne county cases. Wayne has 400 patients in private hospitals and 200 on waiting lists. One hundred beds but a drop in the bucket for the general state picture — but it helps.

State Democrats have been accused of "a disregard of decency" by Congressman George Meander (R - Ann Arbor) following the revelation that a questionnaire was sent out by the state Democratic chairman asking county leaders who they would prefer appointed in case Gov. Williams should have to name a replacement for the ailing Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg.

Michigan again led the nation in number of licensed fishermen last year, but dropped from second to third place in license revenue. The state sold 1,050,756 licenses, taking in \$2,098,397. California distributed 995,520 permits with a total revenue of \$3,023,735.

With the dry season still in the offing, 21 fires already have burned over 315 acres in Michigan this year. In 1950 no fires were recorded until after April 1.

The Little Hoover Commission has tackled the state civil service commission — a man-sized job. There are three ways to handle the 10-year old system: Junk civil service and return to political control; let it continue as it is; revise the system to correct shortcomings pointed up by a recent commission task force report.

The commission did, however, deviate from its usual course of ripping state departments apart by

throwing bouquets at the state corrections system. Says a commission task force: "the prisons are generally well run, clean and adequate, and reasonably well financed by the legislature."

Although the group said the parole and probation systems were sound, it did say Jackson prison is too large for efficient operation.

There are more federal employees in Michigan than there are people on the state's payroll. According to a census, 40,838 Michigan persons are on federal lists, 3,091 more than the state hires.

Many service groups have expressed interest in bringing entertainment and gifts to the patients at Percy Jones Army Hospital at Battle Creek. Before doing so, such groups should contact the Red Cross in their local community.

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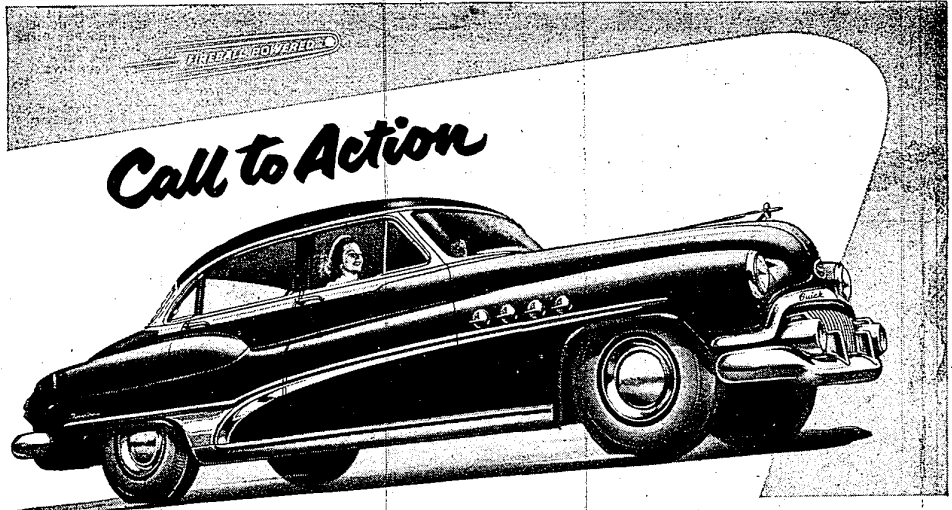
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
