No sketches of the proposed high school units were shown. They will be drawn after determination of the site and school needs.

SEE HALF DAYS

Every elementary class will be on half-day sessions next year, Miss Minnie Ziekle, elementary supervisor, told the group Monday. A total of 48 class rooms will be needed, and with the proposed building program completed, 52 would be available. However, construction of the new schools, if approved by the voters, could not be finished in time for the fall opening. The elementary class room shortage will be aggravated next year by the conversion of nine more class rooms to high school use.

PASS BUDGET

The School Board, meeting previous to the Citizens' Committee session, also passed for approval of the County Board, the 1951 - 52 school budget. The budget is based on an estimated income of \$461,087.00. Of this amount less than 30 per cent comes from local taxation. The bulk of the revenue is received through State Aid.

TOWNSHIP BOARD PURCHASES NEW POLICE CAR

The Farmington Township Board approved the purchase of a new Ford Police car to replace the present car at the regular meeting of the Board Tuesday evening.
