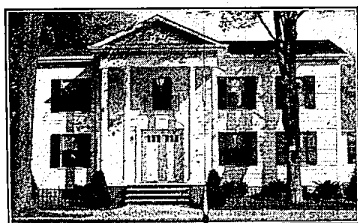

Congress Passes 4 Of 13 Vet Bills

To date, after weeks of this session of the 82nd Congress, there has been no momentous or world-shaking legislation enacted, although there has been a tremendous amount of debate including the so-called "Great Debate" over foreign policy, especially on sequestration of troops to Europe — and who should have the authority, the president or congress. From the standpoint of achievement, the 82nd Congress has a long way to go to catch up to the "Awful 80th".

Congress has spent most of its time conducting various investigations and hearings. It did, however, set around to passing a few bills. Of the 13 bills previously mentioned, four of them made the grade. However, the most important one — in the eyes of the Veterans Organizations — a bill to authorize \$500 more hospital beds, failed to win. The bill providing relief damage against anyone overcharging a G. I. buying a home on a government loan, did.

On April 1 the initial checks for \$55 million dollars for insurance dividends were put in the mails. There are to be approximately 8 million of them, averaging \$55. They are to run over a scheduled two months, so writing in about them will only delay action, says the V. A.

Senator Guy Gillette introduced a bill calling for the release of World War II veterans who had previously served 12 months or more, also stipulating that they be released 30 days after the bill is enacted.

A letter was received by most members of congress recently from Carl Gray, Jr., V.A. Administrator, stating a change in his order to close 321 V.A. contact offices. The number to be closed was lowered to

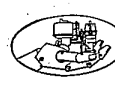

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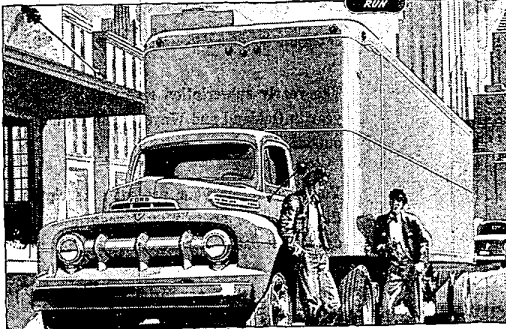
