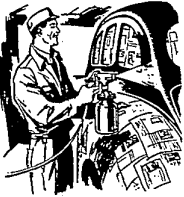

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Roberts and daughters from Monroe spent Friday night with relatives here.

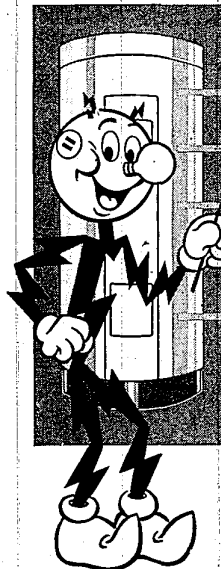
The Edwin Johnsons, Clarita Avenue, visited friends in Grand Rapids last week end.

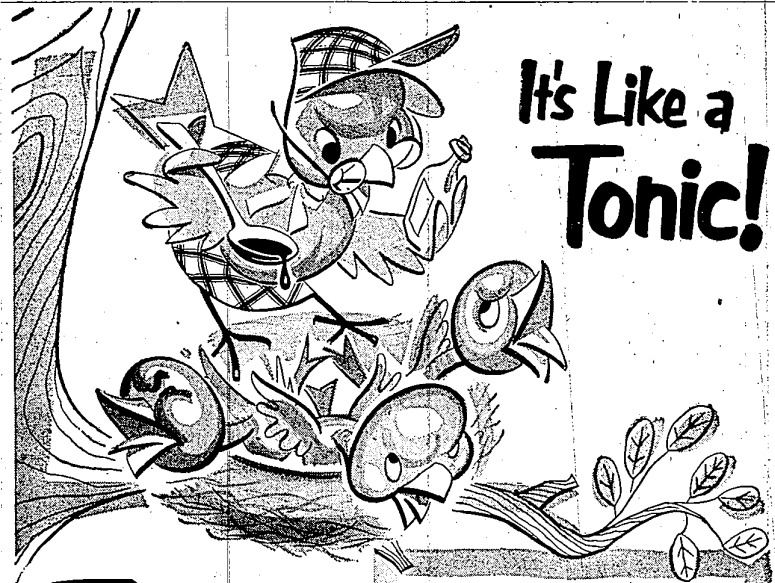
