Lee is the first boy to lead the Farmington Band, and it is his first year in this activity.

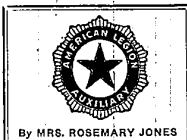
He has also earned the reputation of strutting with an exceptionally high step.

Notice of Application to the Michigan Public Service Commission by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company

For Authority to Make Effective Certain Schedules of Rates, Rentals, and Charges in the FARMINGTON Zone of the Detroit District Exchange

Higher costs inevitably mean higher prices, and the cost of furnishing your telephone service keeps on going up. As the result of wage increases for our employees last November, greater taxes, and the higher costs of services and materials, the rates authorized by the Commission last June are now insufficient to cover our needs. For that reason we shall apply to the Michigan Public Service Commission on May 14, 1951 for authority to apply the proposed rates shown below, and ask the Commission to set a date for a hearing on our request.

MONTHLY ZONE RATES (Excluding Federal Tax)

Telephone rates are based on the number of main telephones which can be reached without extra message charges. Present rates are based on a count of telephones as of September 30, 1948.

Proposed rates are based on the number of telephones as of December 31, 1950.

Temporary Services: Two-party business service now \$5.00 per month would be \$6.25 per month, rural business service now \$4.00 per month would be \$4.75 per month; four-party residence and rural residence services now \$2.25 per month would be \$3.00 per month.								
Semi-Public Telephone Service:								
PRESENT — Guarantee, 20c per day on messages at 5c per message-unit; and, in addition, a monthly charge of \$2.50. Charges for messages to telephones in all zones of the Detroit District Exchange and in WALLED LAKE and *NORTHVILLE are credited against the guarantee.								
PROPOSED — Guarantee, 25c per day on messages at 5c per message-unit. Minimum charge for each message would be 2 message-units. Charges for message-units would be credited against the guarantee as at present.								
Calls from Coin Telephones: It is proposed that all calls from coin telephones now cost 5c would be increased to 10c. Charges on other calls from coin telephones would remain unchanged.
