FARM NEWS

Potato Industry Names Officers

Naming officers for the Michigan Potato Industry was first order of business when board members of the newly-organized association met recently at Boyne City.

New president of the organization is Verli Baldwin, Jackson, serving with him as vice-presidents will be Octave Carrigan, Cornell, representing the Upper Peninsula; Fay Jenkins, Kalkaska, northern lower peninsula; and Clarence Perkins, McBride, southern Michigan.

Fred Hilt, Cadillac, was elected secretary of the organization and Jack Schonfeld, Inlay City, treasurer.

The new organization was voted during a meeting of potato growers at Farmers' Week in early 1951. Main purpose of the group is the promotion of the state's potato industry. The organization will not physically market potatoes, but will seek to represent the entire industry in activities in its interest.

Organization of the group, in answer to many requests from potato growers, was aided by Clarence Prentice of the Michigan State College agricultural economics department and county agricultural agents in potato-producing counties.

Among planned activities for the coming year are exhibits and shows, sponsoring tours and field days, assisting the Cooperative Extension Service in potato educational programs and promoting research in all phases of potato production, harvesting and marketing.

Prentice states that any potato producer, processor, or handler or other person or firm interested in the program of the group is eligible to become a member.

BULLETIN AIDS IN FITTING SON INTO FARMING BUSINESS

If you have a farm and a son or daughter, you may be interested in a new bulletin issued by the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station, "Family Farm-Operating Agreements."

The publication suggests ideas as to when and how to set up a farm operating plan with your son. Also described are methods that successful families are using to work out desirable farm plans.

E. B. Hill, agricultural economist, and Marshall Harris of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, co-authors of the regional publication, offer several suggestions for farm-operating arrangements.

The usual sequence of agreements after a son finishes school are: 1. Enterprise agreements. 2. Wage agreements or wage and share agreements. 3. Profit-sharing or partnership agreements. 4. Rental agreements. Each plan is discussed in detail in the bulletin.

The bulletin reports that getting started — breaking the ice — is often a difficult problem for fathers and sons. Some sons do not know how to approach their fathers on such a topic. Some fathers keep putting it off. Many young men say it is easier for them to talk with mother than with dad about getting started in farming.

Most fathers and mothers are anxious to help. Ways to provide this help include: 1. Favorable arrangements during the 4-H Club and FFA project stage. 2. Providing some financial backing. 3. Using dad's machinery on rented land or on owned land. 4. Providing an opportunity for the son to help into the farm business piecemeal. 5. Outright gifts.

SEWING LESSONS OFFERED BY COUNTY EXTENSION GROUPS

Possible savings of more than \$45,000 in clothing budgets were accomplished in 1950 by Michigan homemakers through their activities in home demonstration groups, sponsored by Michigan State College's Cooperative Extension Service.

Marjorie Eastman, extension clothing specialist, says that high clothing prices have caused many women to turn to home sewing as a means of cutting costs. Remodeling and selection of fabrics have also been popular topics for home demonstration groups.

Training for the projects is provided by clothing specialists from MSC in cooperation with county home demonstration agents. They train leaders, who in turn train local group members — and it is all free.

Instruction is planned to progress from simple garments to more complicated work. Dressmaking has been the most popular subject, with 1,000 dresses made through these lessons. Reports show that in 1950, 3,957 dresses were made at savings of more than \$16,000. Dresses made as a result of previous lessons were valued at \$10,000.

Children's clothing programs grew in popularity in 1950. Home demonstration agents estimate that homemakers saved \$3,000 through these lessons.

Tailoring and remodeling work was valued at \$16,000. Other phases of clothing are presented to the members such as fabric selection and shopping aids.

Home demonstration work is carried on throughout Michigan. If you are interested in joining a group to study phases of homemaking, call at the county extension office in Pontiac.

National Home Demonstration Week will be celebrated throughout the United States from April 29 to May 5 as a salute to the women who are bettering their homes through membership in extension groups.

Over 13,000 Students Enrolled At MSC

A total of 13,033 students enrolled for spring classes at Michigan State College, according to Registrar R. S. Linton.

The total is about 300 more than previously had been predicted by college officials and represents a normal between-terms drop from the 13,338 recorded in the winter quarter. Last year's spring enrollment, an all-time high at MSC, was 14,674 students.

Make Close Check At Farming Time

Watchful care at farming time can help cut new-born pig losses, say swine specialists at Michigan State College.

They suggest that farmers provide comfortable, clean, warm quarters for the sow and pigs. Sows should be eating regularly — if they don't, find out why, the swine specialists advise.

When the litter is born, help the pigs to suckle, especially the weaker ones. If the sow isn't providing any milk, find out the reason.

Watch the sow for any signs of fever, mastitis, or discharge.

Feed Grain Stocks Down From Year Ago

Many Michigan farmers may find themselves short of feed grains before the next harvest rolls around, warns R. C. Hoglund, agricultural economist at Michigan State College.

Stocks of corn, oats and barley on Michigan farms and in elevators on January 1, 1951, were 15 per cent smaller than a year ago.

With increased livestock production expected during 1951, this will mean a 16 to 20 per cent reduction in feed grains available per animal unit.

The smaller feed-grain supply in Michigan is due largely to a 22 million bushel reduction in the 1950 corn crop. This shortage can be relieved by increased feed imports from other states and by more efficient use of present feed stocks, Hoglund advises.

The situation for the United States as a whole is somewhat more favorable. Total U. S. feed grain stocks are about equal to last year. A five per cent reduction in corn stocks was offset by increased supplies of oats, barley and grain sorghum. Total protein feed supplies are about equal to last year.
