MODEL HOMES ON EXHIBIT

MATH DEPARTMENT CONTRIBUTES PROJECTS

Three sections of the math department will contribute examples of the year's work. Projects will be entered from the Junior High math classes, plane geometry and solid geometry classes.

The Junior High display will consist of solid figures which students were assigned to make as part of their work near the beginning of the year. Projects consist of pyramids, cylinders, spheres, cubes and other solids. In addition, standard linear and cubic measurements will be shown. A few mathematical in-

struments may possibly be displayed.

The plane geometry classes will exhibit their semester projects. Students could submit projects, consisting of instruments involving geometric principles in their construction, poems and stories pertaining to geometry, scrapbooks showing possible geometric theories applied or designs used in the construction of buildings or their architectural decorations, or any other thing in which geometry is applied.

Objects from spheres to twenty-sided polyhedrons will highlight the solid geometry display. The projects were to be made as part of the classes' assignments earlier in the year. Since no restrictions were placed on the type of material which could be used in making the solids, some clever and original models were used in the construction of them.

Miss Lingo has charge of the plane geometry exhibit; Mrs. Oliphant and Mr. Gieger, Junior High; and Mr. Oliver, solid geometry.

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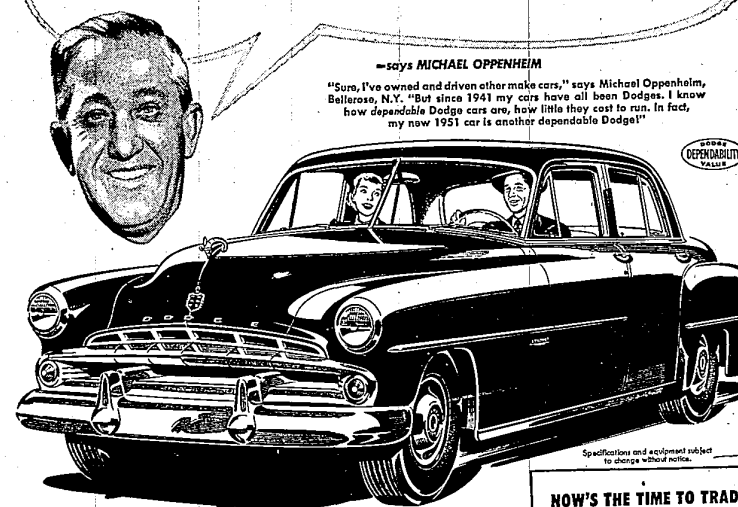
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
