Mr. and Mrs. John Palackey entertained the West Farmington Farm Bureau May 10 at their home on 12 Mile Road.

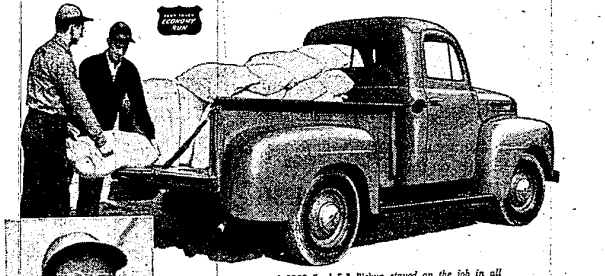
