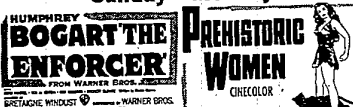

The ordinance is brought to an election. Elections are expensive and should be avoided unless there is no other method available.

"With this in mind the Zoning Board wishes to assure the people that their minds are still entitled open to suggestions from anyone who is a citizen and they will not hesitate to change the ordinance to meet the reasonable needs or desires of the people, or to correct any inequities. The Board will welcome any suggestions or information, and as heretofore made known, will not hesitate to leave any section or parts unamended if convinced the majority in that part so desire.

"It should be stated that the Zoning Board has done its work without pay, solely because the members have felt it a civic duty resulting from an apparent need.

"Every township contiguous to Farmington Township is already zoned. This creates a rather acute problem. The matter should be given as quick treatment as is consistent with thoroughness."

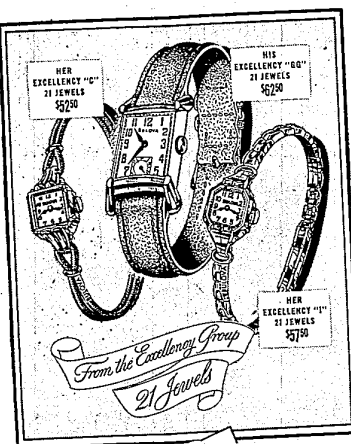

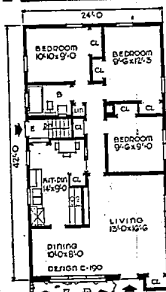
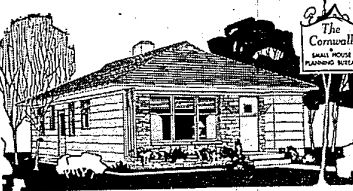
