"Child Needs To Be Bad" Mothers Told

"Children need to be bad," Mrs. Dorothy LaCamera, of the Michigan Children's Aid Society, told her audience at the meeting of the Charneville PTA on May 15. "Being of success, bad sometimes," continued Mrs. LaCamera, "helps the child to distinguish between acceptable and unacceptable behavior. However," she warned, "consistent naughtiness is a danger signal. If allowed to continue, it will result in the building up of deep seated resentment which often manifests itself in later delinquency."

In her address on "The Emotional Needs of Children," Mrs. LaCamera listed further child needs as the basic need for love and security, the sense of belonging, the need of the child to be accepted for himself, the need to grow nor-

mally and to experiment and to be given definite duties in the home. The latter need will give both a feeling of responsibility and a taste of success.

Mrs. LaCamera emphasized the need of discipline, and in some cases, rather strict discipline. "It can be administered without harm," she declared, "if it is given without anger, and if the child knows he is loved and wanted." Mrs. LaCamera stated that emotional needs of children start simultaneously with physical needs — at birth.

The elementary schools, under the direction of Leo Larue, presented an entertaining half-hour of band and guitar music.

AMOUNT OF FOOD, NOT PRICE, TELLS VALUE OF PURCHASE

With food prices as they are at present, the best practice is to learn how much actual edible food you are buying for the money you spend, says Mary Morr of the foods and nutrition department of Michigan State College's school of home economics.

Citing an example, she says a homemaker may go to the meat market and find that beef short ribs are only 49 cents per pound and ground beef is 69 cents, per pound.

It might seem that the short ribs would be the better buy, considering only the price per pound. But check the amount of actual meat or the number of serving portions that come from each type of meat on the pound basis, she advises.

Short ribs are almost 50 per cent waste in the bone that is purchased, so that only two or possibly three servings come from each pound of short ribs. On the other hand, the ground beef is all meat as it is purchased — there is no waste in the form of bone or excess fat so you can count on four serving portions from one pound of ground beef.

The National Nutrition Council recommends that a well-balanced day's meals include one-fourth portion of a protein food in the form of meat, fish, poultry or their equivalent in the form of eggs and cheese.

In planning to meet these requirements for a family of four, it would be necessary to purchase a pound of ground beef — but two pounds in the short ribs to furnish an equal amount of meat.

Standing brushes or brooms with the bristles down will cause them to become warped and broken.

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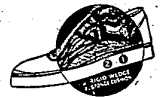
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
