

MICHIGAN STATE EXPECTS RECORD CROWD JUNE 1-3

A record gathering of Michigan State College alumni parents and friends are expected to invade the East Lansing campus for annual Alumni - Day - Commencement festivities, June 1-3.

The week end will begin Friday with alumni registration and end Sunday with commencement in Mackinac Field stadium. A total of 3,575 students will be eligible to participate in commencement, including 2,224 completing work for degrees at the end of the spring term.

Nelson A. Rockefeller, chairman of the advisory board for President Truman's Point Four program, will deliver the graduation address at 5 p.m. One of the top U. S. ex-pats on international affairs, Rockefeller will speak on "The Free Citizen's Responsibility to the World Community."

Traditional alumni reunions will include the classes of 1906, 1911, 1916, 1920, 1921, 1934, 1941 and 1946.

The class of 1920 will hold its silver anniversary, and President John A. Hannah will preside over the annual Patriarch's dinner when the class of 1951 will be accepted to membership.

Along entertainment lines, Saturday highlights will be the Lani Parade, Water Carnival, Commencement - Alumni dance, and a base-

Judge Schulte Warns Drivers

Judge J. J. Schulte last week announced that his court is taking all former car speeders with engines cars have had brakes. "When other traffic is around and likely to be endangered then a motorist who exceeds the speed limit with a car that has had brakes is committing the offense called reckless driving and if found guilty must expect to pay the higher fine than the law provides."

In explaining the danger of bad brakes, the Judge said, "In a business or residential area under favorable conditions the law says that a motorist must be sure to stop within 40 feet in front of him because that is the legal stopping distance for 25 miles per hour — the speed limit in such areas. Now, when a speeder with bad brakes which will take him double the legal stopping distance for that speed it will take him 80 feet in which to stop. With other traffic present no motorist can be sure that no one will get in front of him within this 80 feet. Thus his violation threatens to endanger other motorists' lives."

The Judge also pointed out that under a new law all cars must be equipped with headlights in good working condition — in the daytime as well as at night. "With traffic accidents increasing the people of Michigan are not willing to gamble that a car found with lights unsafe in the daytime will not be driven at night," the Judge said.

MSC VET SCHOOL GETS APPROVAL FROM VETS GROUP

Michigan State College's School of Veterinary Medicine has been given full approval by the American Veterinary Medical Association after being on probation since 1948 for lack of adequate facilities.

AVMA action to remove MSC from the probationary list came early in May in a statement to President John A. Hannah. The AVMA said that with the completion of Giltner Hall, \$2,400,000 state-financed veterinary medical center, the major causes for probation are in the process of being removed.

The MSC school was warned in 1946 that facilities, particularly in clinical training, were not adequate to train the 65 students quota of the school. Another AVMA inspection committee then placed the school on council probation in 1948.

Accreditation was made on the basis of 61 students, meaning the school will be equipped to train that number with the completion of Giltner Hall in January, 1952.

Giltner Hall is being financed by the State of Michigan with part of the appropriation made last year and the remainder expected to be forthcoming this session, according to Dr. C. S. Bryan, dean of veterinary medicine.

In commenting on the removal of the school from the probation by the AVMA, Dean Bryan said: "The full approval of the MSC School of Veterinary Medicine by the AVMA can be attributed to the cooperation of the state legislature and other interested parties."

"On behalf of the college, the School of Veterinary Medicine and the state of Michigan and the Michigan legislature for this assistance which enables us to continue and make better our services to veterinary science."

PUBLIC HEARING

Hamlin indicated that estimates of cost will be presented to the Council on the repair of Brookline, Power, Park and Wilmarth; the building up of several streets in the Floral Park section, as well as patching on a number of other city streets.

Mahon, who worked at General Motors' Diesel division, has been at work on engineer projects including many bridges. Promoted to corporal in January, he is in charge of a work gang of Korean laborers at Checheon.
