SEA SCOUTS PLAN TO MOVE CABIN FROM TOWN PARK

The log cabin, in the Town Hall Park, is expected to be moved this month by members of the newly organized Farmington Sea Scout Ship which was announced this week.

The cabin which has served as a landmark in Farmington for a good many years, is to be removed to a location near Pontiac for use by the Farmington unit as well as an explorer post in Pontiac. For several years the cabin has been abandoned, and the City Commission recently condemned the building after it found that repair was impossible. The council recently agreed to give the building to the sea scouts if it was removed from the site.

It is to be torn down by log and removed to the Pontiac site. The new sea scout ship is under the leadership of Ronnie Bell. The cabin will be equipped with bunks and will serve as summer and winter quarters for the two units.

Spence Drain Meeting To Be Held June 13

Property owners affected by the natural course of water beginning at a point near Merriam and 5 Mile Roads in Oakland County and 5 Mile Roads in a southern diagonal course toward Six Mile and Middlebelt are requested to attend a meeting Wednesday evening, June 13 at 8:00 p.m. at the home of James D. Spence, 1950 Millbrook.

The meeting is in regards to the proposed Spence Drain. A total of 40 signatures are still needed from property owners whose taxes are paid and who are directly affected by the drain before action can be started. The immediate benefits of this drain will eliminate water overflowing at 5 Mile and Merriam as well as adjacent property.

Property owners are requested to bring their tax receipt to the meeting at Spence's home Wednesday in order that a description of their property can be recorded on the petition.

Teachers Attend Wildlife School

Teachers and school administrators from many parts of the state will get answers to what and why is conservation at the state conservation department's Wildlife School training school starting June 10.

Returning to school are over 100 instructors and administrators who are winners of conservation scholarships awarded by the Michigan Federated Garden clubs. Some 80 clubs are paying expenses of the teachers who are selected on recommendation of local school officials.

The fifth annual scholarship school has been enlarged into three sessions. Two were conducted previously. One group of award winners will attend June 10-16, another June 24-30, and the final group August 19-25.

Specialists on natural resources, including game, fish, forestry, geology and land, will lead study sessions and conduct field trips to conservation projects. Among the special speakers are: Paul Barrett, Michigan State college, department of conservation; Professors George Wheeler and Irene Jones, Central Michigan college of education; Norman Billings, state water resources commission; and Richard Drullinger, soil conservation service, Traverse City.
