

## Forest Fire Loss Remains Low

While neighboring Ontario is recording its biggest forest fire loss of the spring season, running into thousands of acres, conservation department suppression crews had a comparatively breather last week.

## Spices Add Zest To Common Foods

Spices are often not used except in seasoning of baked goods, pickles, or perhaps cooking ham. However, Ruth Insalls of the Michigan State College school of home economics, points out that spices on the kitchen shelf can be put to work to give old dishes new flavors.

For best results, she advises that they be used sparingly, since too much of any spice is worse than none at all.

For cinnamon, she suggests that it be used as flavoring for ice cream, or to season ham, lamb, and pork chops. It can also be used in fruit pies.

Cloves can be used to season beans, butts, squash, and sweet potatoes. Try adding one or two cloves to hot or iced tea while it is being made.

Gliger can be used with beef, lamb, veal, and poultry. The home economist suggests that nutmeg can be added to white sauce which is to be used for vegetables. Sprinkle it lightly on buttered carrots, cauliflower, kale, potatoes, sweet potatoes and succotash. It can also be used in soups and for seasoning beef.

## See Favorable Water Level In Lakes

What may be the highest upstate ground water level reading this year was recorded by conservation department geologists in May.

With a more modest 12 of a foot rise in May, as compared to 1.32 in April, the May reading at north central lower peninsula test wells averaged 2.65 feet.

The May reading is 43 of a foot above the last ten-year May average and 23 of a foot below the May record high set in 1949.

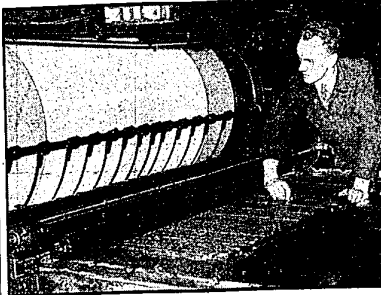
Monthly stages this spring indicate water levels of ground water and "water table" lakes should be favorable this summer.

Membership in the Michigan Suburban Credit Association provides a safe-guard, whereby, a merchant can extend credit on a safe and profitable basis.

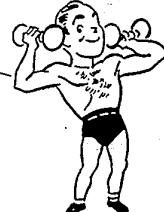
