Summer Months Worst Foundation Lists

Distribution of 1,500,000 "Polio Pointers for 1951" to every Michigan school child has begun by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which receives its sole support from the annual March of Dimes Campaign.

In an effort to keep Michigan's case load as low as possible during the summer months when this crippling epidemic disease is most likely to strike, the Foundation issued the following advice:

Don't get overtired by hard play, exercise, work or travel. This means men, women or children.

Don't get chilled. Don't bathe or swim long in cold water or sit around in wet clothes.

Don't have mouth or throat operations during a polio outbreak.

Don't use another person's towels, dishes, tableware or the like.

Don't take children to places where there is polio. Ask your health department.

Don't take your child out of town.

Senator Homer Ferguson has started a "background" luncheon custom with newsmen in Washington who represent Michigan newspapers and radio stations. Each Thursday they have a Dutch treat meal in Ferguson's office while he briefs them on background and matters relating to this state.

Deer herd reproduction in critically over-browsed areas may be reduced by 50 per cent this spring, according to conservation department officials.

The state civilian defense headquarters has organized 28 100-plane air mobile defense units. The units would supply fast transportation of needed specialists and supplies in time of emergency. Backbone of the set-up is 14,501 volunteer pilots, 243 airports and 192 aviation schools cooperating with the project.

Some 4,596 new teachers will be graduated from Michigan colleges this year as against 1,380 four years ago, but the teacher shortage will continue. Dr. T. Luther Purdom, University of Michigan director of occupational information, predicts 2,000 more instructors will be needed.

Fewer Trapping Licenses Issued In '51 Season

Fewer trapping licenses were issued this spring, however, the conservation department reports northern lower peninsula trappers harvested about 36 per cent more beaver in the season which ended March 31. That 1951 extended upper peninsula trapping period ended April 14.

Trappers purchased 4574 licenses as compared to 5,044 in the 1950 spring season. Pelts sealed in the northern lower peninsula totaled 1,256 as compared to 1,256 before. Otter take was about the same, 114 tagged this year as against 119 the previous season.

Polio Precautions

camp or playground, where there is good health supervision.

Do — allow children to play with friends; they have been with right along. Keep them away from new people, especially in the close daily living of a home.

Do — wash hands carefully before eating, and always after using the toilet — especially important when polio is around. Also keep food clean and covered.

Do — watch for signs of sickness, such as headache, fever, sore throat, upset stomach, sore muscles, stiff neck or back, extreme tiredness or nervousness, trouble in breathing or swallowing.

Do — put a sick person to bed at once, away from others, and call the doctor. Quick action may lessen crippling.

Do — telephone your local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. If you need help, locate through telephone book or health department. No patient need go without care for lack of money. Your chapter will pay what you cannot afford.

Do — Remember — at least half of all polio patients get well without any crippling.

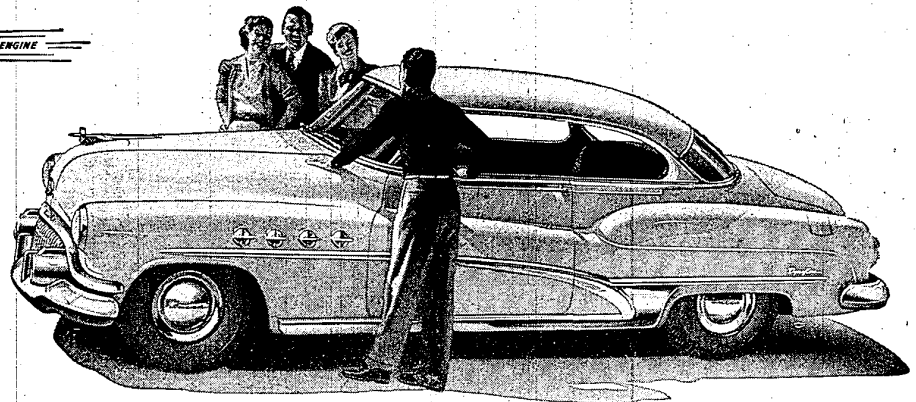
