Both of the celebrants were born in 1873. Mrs. Harding can remember that as Maggie Dine, she crossed the country in a covered wagon before meeting Mr. Harding on her return to Ohio.

The Hardings had 13 children, 10 of whom died in infancy. Only three were raised to adulthood, and are still living. A boy, Mr. Thomas E. Harding of Southfield, is the father of two children. Two married daughters, Mrs. Mable Ripaldi and Mrs. Catherine Alt, also have families of their own; Mrs. Ripaldi has 17 children, and resides in Farmington.

Their granddaughter, Mrs. Florence Kaminski, and her husband reside with the Hardings in the Shilawasee Street home built by Mr. Harding years ago.

Mrs. Harding suffered a paralytic stroke in her right side in 1949, and Mr. Harding cared for her until his own health gave out this spring.

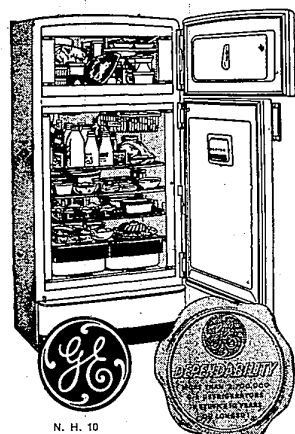
Pvt. Louis E. Maitland Arrives At Percy Jones

He will be treated for wounds received while serving with the Second Division in Korea.

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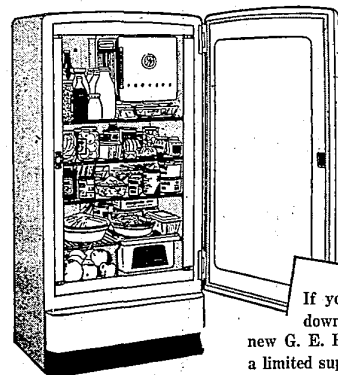
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
