## Fishing Season Opens Monday

Monday, June 25, is the 18th day of the state's most popular fishing season which the conservation department anticipates will draw 175-200,000 anglers, or slightly fewer than on the Sunday opening last year.

However, a somewhat larger hook and line legion, 500 to 600,000 persons, is expected to be in action through the first week end, as compared to the crowd in the first seven days last year. So far, fishing licenses have been moving at about a 12 per cent faster rate.

There are no regulation changes, the department points out. Recent fishing legislation, when and if signed by the Governor, will not have any effect until next year.

June 25 touches off some six to nine months of bluegill, sunfish and black bass fishing. Many other species also become legal cane pole targets in southern Michigan below M-16. These are northern pike, walleye pike, crappies, rock bass, yellow perch, warmouth bass, whitefish and white bass. Others are listed in the fish law digest which the angler gets with his license.

Pike season already is under way above the Muskegon - Port Sanilac line (Highway M-16) where there is no closed season on crappies and the other species mentioned.

Daily creel limit on bluegills, sunfish, perch, rock bass, crappies and warmouth bass continues at 25 in any combination of which not more than 15 may be bluegills. There is no minimum size limit.

White bass must be seven inches long, daily possession limit ten. Whitefish of any length may be taken, maximum daily limit seven.

For northern pike, walleyes, large mouth black bass and small mouth black bass the daily maximum is five in any combination on inland lakes and streams. Minimum size limits are 14 inches for northern, 13 inches for walleyes, and 10 inches for either bass species.

Frogs may be taken beginning June 25, except that they must be speared at night with artificial light.

The department's fish division operates 560 public fishing sites, about two-thirds of which are usable or improved.

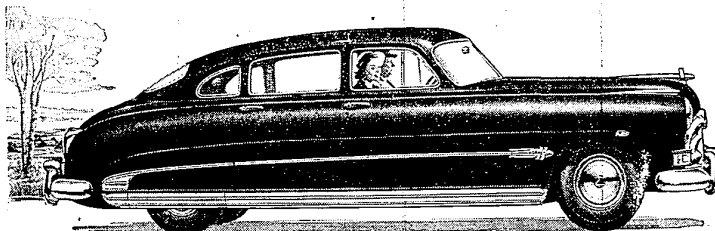
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
