

Fly Control  
No Easy Job

Fly control is no easy job around  
the farm, but sanitation and use  
of recommended spray materials  
can make it less difficult. Ray  
James, Michigan State College en-  
tomologist, explains.

Sanitation means getting rid of  
any places where flies breed. Janes  
advises that breeding places are  
done away with. It is doubtful that  
spray materials will do the control  
job. Before starting to use spray  
materials, he suggests that manure  
piles, damp areas, calf pens and all  
such areas be thoroughly cleaned  
up.

Present regulations are against  
use of DDT in the dairy barn. Lindane  
or methoxychlor will give good  
control of flies in barns, James  
reports. Ten pounds of 25  
per cent wettable lindane powder  
or 40 pounds of 50 per cent wet-  
table methoxychlor powder in 100  
gallons of water is the right mix-  
ture. James says it should be ap-  
plied in a coarse spray, but not in  
quantities that will run off the  
walls. Care should be taken not to  
spray feeds, watering cups or man-  
gers.

For treating outside walls or pic-  
ture DDT may be used at the rate  
of 40 pounds of 50 per cent wettable  
DDT powder to 100 gallons of water.  
Chlordane, at a rate of 16 pounds  
of 50 per cent wettable powder for  
100 gallons of water may also be  
used. Lindane mixed the same as  
for inside use, is also effective.

James says most farmers find lin-  
dane a bit more satisfactory than  
methoxychlor for inside use, and  
some have mixed the two for good  
control.

Sheep Breeders  
To Meet July 20

Michigan sheep breeders have  
picked Friday, July 20, as the date  
for the third annual Sheep Field  
Day. It will be held this year at  
Michigan State College instead of  
the Eaton County Fairgrounds.  
Graydon Blank, MSC livestock spe-  
cialist, reports.

Results of recent experiments in  
preventing lamb losses, particularly  
from stiff lamb disease, will be fea-  
tured on the program. The usual  
judging contest and discussion of  
purebred breeds will also take  
place.

One of the best ways to handle  
the heat problem with dairy cattle  
on pasture is to provide a rack of  
dry hay or straw for the animals.  
If placed near the watering or rest-  
ing place, Michigan State College  
dairymen say cows will consume  
the hay, which need not be of best  
quality.

COWS SWEAT  
LITTLE SO EAT  
LESS WHEN HOT

When the weather really gets  
hot, a man breaks out in a sweat  
and the perspiration keeps his body  
cool. But a cow sweats very  
little and as the temperature in-  
creases, her body heat rises sharply.

C. F. Huffman, dairy research au-  
thority at Michigan State College,  
has found that different dairy cows  
vary in ability to stand high tem-  
peratures. When the barn tem-  
perature was 95 degrees some cows  
had body temperatures up to 100  
degrees with respiration rate of  
about 125 a minute. Another cow,  
next to these, had a normal body  
temperature of about 101.5 degrees  
with respiration of about 25.

The average cow converts about  
one-fourth of her feed into milk,  
the other three-fourths of her food  
energy is waste heat. Since her  
"cooling system" is not very effec-  
tive, she often stops eating. That  
cuts down milk production.

Although some dairy breeds stand  
the heat better than others, the hot  
weather problem is one that dairy  
researchers must face. They have  
found that pastures with adequate  
shade helps keep cows cooler.

Some farmers allow the cattle to  
come back into the barn or shed  
in the heat of the day. If it is  
cooler and free from flies, the cows  
find it more comfortable. After  
they've had their fill of grass, dairy  
cows will usually find the most  
comfortable spot if allowed the free-  
dom of choice.

U. S. Department of Agriculture  
authorities are working on cross-  
breeding dairy animals that will  
stand higher temperatures without  
a drop in production, but have  
reached no conclusive results.

A six-months accumulation of  
manure on a farm carrying twelve  
milking cows and corresponding  
young stock is equivalent to more  
than five tons of 10-5-10 fertilizer.  
At current prices, that would cost  
\$200, so Michigan State College  
soils authorities say it's wise and  
economical to make use of manure.

The quick, easy way to rid your  
lawn of broad leaf plants is spray-  
ing with 2, 4-D weed killers. But  
be careful the spray drift does not  
get on shrubs, trees or flowers.

Cultivation Kills  
Quack Grass

Quack grass is one of the big  
farm problems in Michigan. D. L.  
Clanahan, farm crops specialist,  
says the best and most economical  
way to rid a field of the obnoxious  
grass is through summer fallowing.  
Late June or early July, as soon  
as the hay is removed, is the time  
Clanahan recommends that farm-  
ers start working fields with a field  
cultivator. The grass is the worst  
out right after it is cut and the  
weather is usually warm and dry.


By working the field first in one  
direction and then the other with  
about a week between cultivations,  
the roots and stems are brought to  
the surface. The heat and wind  
finally take the life from them after  
six to eight weeks.

The dead material should be left  
in the field as organic matter and  
worked into the soil, the crops au-  
thority relates. About August 15,  
full rye, well fertilized with a com-  
mercial fertilizer, can be planted.  
It can be used as a fall and early  
spring pasture, then turned under  
for a green manure crop and the  
field is ready for crops the follow-  
ing summer.

"A halfhearted attitude lessens  
the chance of success," Clanahan  
commented, adding that quack  
grass is a "tough character" and  
must be given rough treatment if it  
is to be killed.

Iron and steel scrap is needed

Leadership School

Michigan State College July 16 - 27.  
Objectives of the conference are  
to stimulate research on basic rural  
community problems and improve  
working relationships between all  
agencies serving rural life.

In addition to classroom sessions,  
group activities will include chapel  
worship, workshops, industrial  
tours and visits to churches and  
nearby rural communities.

The leadership school operates  
on the basis of a three-year pro-  
gram, with both required and elec-  
tive courses being offered. Requi-  
sit courses will run for two weeks  
and the electives are a week long.
