**FAWN CROP LOW IN OVERBROWSED DEER RANGES**  
"Fawn droppings" period has passed and the conservation department deer men report, and is practically over for this year. A few does give birth to fawns during July and an occasional fawn will show up as late as deer season. Heavy vegetation growth in northern deer country is making it difficult to see the new fawns but they are lurking in the woods just the same. Does customarily drop two fawns, infrequently three, and on rare occasions as many as four. Sex ratio is about even with bucks slightly predominating. It is too early for department field men to check the effect of the heavy winter in causing a smaller fawn crop. An early spring frosty season indicated deer herd reproduction in critically overbrowsed northern lower peninsula range might be reduced as much as 50 per cent. In the special investigation, about 100 adult does were examined which had been accidentally killed in car and train collisions. A few were victims of dogs and starvation. Does in the critical area averaged .37 of an embryo fawn each, as compared to the usual average of 1.5 or more fawns. In non-critical sections, does examined averaged 1.57, embryo fawns each.

## Save Time In Sandwich Making

"Beat the rush" is a good motto when it comes to sandwich making. Says Margaret Wallace of the Michigan State College school of home economics. Advance preparation can save time - and the sandwiches will be just as good.

You save time when a mechanical refrigerator or an icebox, they should not be made up more than 24 hours in advance from the time they will be used. The sandwiches can be frozen by freezing them in the freezing compartment of the refrigerator or in the frozen food cabinet.

Sandwiches that are frozen and kept in the freezing compartment of the refrigerator should not be held over for more than a week at a time. Those that are frozen and kept in the frozen food cabinet can be made up and kept several months.

Tests show that sandwiches wrapped in wax paper or cellophane for freezing or refrigeration were more satisfactory than those wrapped in parchment paper sandwich bags. When sealed in cellophane, moist fillings tend to become soggy and wet from moisture. Varieties that have been found to be satisfactory in sealed cellophane were cream cheese on bread, butter on bread or peanut butter on bread because these fillings are not too moist. Each sandwich should be labeled and wrapped separately. If several sandwiches are wrapped in one package, the individual flavors are apt to mingle.

When sandwiches are prepared for freezing or refrigeration, never allow the bread or filler to remain at room temperature for a longer period than four hours. Miss Wallace warns that dangerous food poisoning bacteria grow well in moist fillings, and especially well in moist bread. An acid ingredient like green olives, lemon juice or pickle in a sandwich filling combination, such as ham salad, chicken salad or egg salad retards the growth of these bacteria.

**345 Mile Migration**  
Not Record For Trout

That rainbow trout which migrated from the upper peninsula's Black River as far as the Detroit River, recently reported by the conservation department, is no record worthy hike.

But the minimum of 345 travel miles is second only to the one of at least 412 miles set by a rainbow trout, number 13,655, in 1942, the department's institute for fisheries research says. Number 13,655 was tagged and released in Isos County's Guiley pond and recovered off Long Point on the Canadian shore of Lake Erie.

The 345-mile, with tag number 49,123, was released less than six months ago and caught by pickerel fisherman Clifford Dasher of Pickering.

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## WORKER OVER 40 AND HANDICAPPED TO BE U-M TOPIC

Rehabilitating the handicapped worker over forty years of age will be the topic for the Fourth Annual University of Michigan conference on the problem of our aging population.

A three-day program has been scheduled for July 11, 12 and 13 under the sponsorship of the University of Michigan conference on the problem of our aging population.

Dr. Howard A. Rusk of the New York University College of Medicine and a member of the editorial staff of the New York Times will discuss "Rehabilitation: Nature and Magnitude of the Problem" at the opening session in the Rackham Building on Wednesday, July 11.

The afternoon program, starting at 1:30 p.m., will be devoted to a general session on the medical aspects of rehabilitating the handicapped worker followed by clinical sessions on this subject. A public meeting is scheduled for 8 p.m., but details on the program are not yet complete.

Thursday morning's topic will be the psycho-social and economic aspects of the problem and the afternoon subject will be employment and placement. Discussion group meetings are set for 3:30 p.m. to consider specific problems and to formulate recommendations.

A 6:30 p.m. dinner at the Michigan Union will be followed by a talk on "Looking Back on Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation" by Dr. Frank Yruse of the Mayo Clinic.

The Friday morning topic will be "Rehabilitation: Services and Programs." Adjournment is set for 3:30 p.m. following a luncheon at the Union. In addition to summary reports, Mary A. Seider, director of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation of the Federal Security Agency, will tell how common needs can be met through cooperation.
