The party will be "An Old Fashioned Tea Party" according to the group. A display of souvenirs of old Farmington will be shown at the party, to be held at the high school gym.

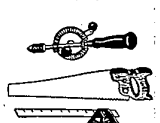

Survey Crews Take Piscatorial Census In State

What kind, size and number of fish are in the lake?

This perpetually intriguing question with thousands of fishermen is going to be at least partially answered this summer in the case of 44 lakes and portions of the Pine White, Carp and Chequamegon River systems. Five conservation department survey crews have started examining the first few summer project waters.

Besides a fish inventory, including some scale sampling for reproduction information, the lakes are scheduled for temperature and chemistry analysis. A few lakes will be mapped. Stream findings will serve as a guide for an extensive habitat improvement program being considered.
